ANOTHER IMPORTANT LAW .- The folowing act in relation to the building of bridges by County commissioners, was bassed at the last session of the State Legslature. We copy it as a matter of importance to our citizens:

A Supplement to the Act relative to Roads and Bridges, i.e. Section 1. Be it enacted, That when a river, creek or rivulet, over which it may be necessary to erect a b.idge, crosses a public road or highway, and the erecting of such bridge requires more expenses than it is reasonable that one or two adjoining townships should bear, that after a view has been ordered bear, that after a view has been ordered by the proper court as now provided by law, if it shall appear by the report of the viewers and by the approval of the court and grand jury, that such bridge is necessary and would be too expensive for such townships to bear, that whenever the county commissioners do not deem it ad-visable to enter such bridge on record as a county bridge, but shall consider it proper to assist such township or townships in building the same, they are hereby author-ized and empowered.
