WHAT THE DEMOCRATS IN CONGRESS PRO-POSE TO DO ABOUT THEM.

WASHINGTON, February 11 .- The Dem-Washington, February 11.—The Democrats having failed to repeal the Federal election laws, they will do the next best thing from their standpoint—amend them. Senator Wallace's bill, introduced a day or two ago, making it unlawful for any marshal, deputy marshal or supervisor to arrest any election officer on the day of election, but providing that a warrant may be executed. viding that a warrant may be executed on any subsequent day, is intended to remedy one of the evils complained of in the Federal election laws. The Re-publicans in Congress have invariably expressed a willingness to correct any defects in the laws, and proper amendments will not be opposed by them. The power of summary arrests now vested in marshals, their deputies and supervisors, might be used, if partnership so directed to decrive a rolling place. pervisors, might be used, if partnership so directed, to deprive a polling place of all its election officers. The President, in one of his veto messages sent to the extra session, advised that the election laws be amended and strengthened rather than repealed, and hence it is assumed that he will not object to proper amendagent. proper amendment.
