The Census.

From the Huntingdon Monitor.

The tenth census of the population, wealth and industry of the United States will be taken during the month of June next. The plan for conducting the work differs materially from that of any preceding census and the results will be much fuller and more complete. Each State has been divided into a suitable number of supervisors' districts. In Pennsylvania there are ten. For each of these districts a supervisor has been, or will be, appointed by the President, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, whose duty is: To propose to the Superintendent, under such general directions as that officer may give the appointment of the territory of his district into suitable sub-districts; to designate to the superintendent suitable persons, and with his consent, to employ them as enumerators, one for each sub-division and resident therein; to furnish the enumerators with the necessary blanks, instruct them relating to their duties, and to scrutinize their returns and see that their work has been performed in all respects in compliance with law, etc.

The act of 1879 provides that a subdivision assigned any enumerator shall not exceed four thousand inhabitants, according to the census of 1870. The superintendent is disposed, in order that the work may be done promptly and thoroughly, to have the sub-districts much smaller than this maximum. Enumerators are to be selected solely with reference to their fitness for the proper discharge of their duties. The superintendent remarks on this subject: "It would not merely be a wrong to the Government, but it would be a positive cruelty to the appointee himself, for a supervisor to confer a commission as enumerator upon any person not of decided clerical aptitude and of active habits, writing freely, and good at figures." The compensation, which may be either a specific sum for each living inhabitant, each death reported, etc., or \$4 for each ten hours' actual field work, is optional with the superintendent and will be decided by him in advance. A law of this State approved the 15th day of May, 1874, declares that every person holding any office or appointment of profit or trust under the United States, shall be capable of holding or exercising, at the same time, the office or appointment of Justice of the Peace, Notary Public, Mayor, Recorder, Burgess or Alderman of any city, corporate town or borough, Constable, Judge, Inspector or Clerk of election under this Commonwealth.

All applications for appointments should be addressed to the supervisor of the proper district, and if the writer desires an acknowledgement of the receipt thereof, he should inclose stamps to pay return postage. Long petitions signed by everybody carry little weight. Personal interviews are not desirable. The qualifications of an applicant can be most clearly shown by written communication from men of good character or standing in his neighborhood or county, accompanied with a letter dictated and written by the applicant himself. No appointments can be made until after the supervisor has been commissioned and sworn and the sub-districting completed.

This, the Seventh District of Pennsylvania, comprises fourteen counties, for which J. Simpson Africa, of the borough of Huntingdon, Huntingdon county, has been appointed and confirmed as supervisor. The population of these counties, and the principle towns therein, according to the census of 1870, was as follows:

What Webster Said.

From the Clinton Democrat. History is full of warning as to the downfall of republics. Corruption and extravagance first sap the moral foundations, and then an army of mercenaries complete the work. In his memorable oration on the completion of Bunker Hill monument, Daniel Webster described the present situation with almost the spirit of prophecy in these striking words: "Quite too frequent resort is made to military force; and quite too much of the substance of the people is consumed in maintaining armies, not for defense against foreign aggression, but for forcing obedience to domestic authority. Standing armies are the oppressive instruments for governing the people in the hands of hereditary and arbitrary monarchs. A military republic, a Government founded on mock elections, and supported only by the sword, is a movement indeed, but a retrograde and disastrous movement, from the regular and old-fashioned monarchical system. If men would enjoy the blessings of Republican government, they must govern themselves by reason, by mutual counsel and consultation, by a sense and feeling of general interest, and by the acquiescence of the minority in the will of the majority, properly expressed, and above all, the military must be kept, according to the language of our bill of rights, in strict subordination to the civil authority. Wherever this lesson is not learned and practiced, there can be no political freedom. Absurd, preposterous is it, a scuff and a satire on free forms of constitutional liberty, for forms of government to be prescribed by military leaders, and the right of suffrage to be exercised at the point of the sword."

When Daniel Webster gave utterance to these American sentiments, the country was at peace as it now is, and the regular army was little more than a third of its present number.

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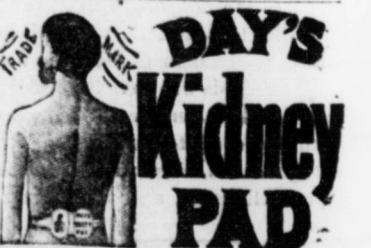
