#### STATE NEWS.

It is estimated that the tobacco crop covers 179,000 acres in Pennsylvania.

Michael McCaskey, while intoxicated, fell down stairs at Wilkesbarre on Friday and was killed.

Shenandoah, Schuylkill county, has 10,000 inhabitants, and not a colored person among them.

The axe and hoe works at Beaver Falls are turning out 1,000 hoes a day for Southern dealers.

In the case against Peter Herdic and H. E. Taylor, charged with conspiracy, a nolle prosequi was entered on Friday, at Williamsport, by the prosecution.

The Connelville public schools were closed on Thursday, on account of the prevalence of diphtheria. Thirty deaths from the disease have occurred recently among the children of that place.

A limb of the chestnut tree in the top of which Fenwick McLeod, of Clearfield, was hunting for nuts, broke under the young man's weight and precipitated him to a pile of stones thirty feet below. He received injuries that most likely will prove fatal.

Lafayette Liess is a young man of Reading who locally has earned the appellation of "Hercules." Recently the Eagle saw a 150 pound stone broken on his chest with a 16-pound sledge hammer. The muscles of his arms stand out like whipcords. He lifts a thousand pounds with the ease of a derrick.

Enos Cummings is a Westmoreland farmer. On Tuesday night of last week while he was riding alone near Logan's Ferry he encountered a footpad, who leveled a pistol at him, commanding him to halt. Mr. Cummings threw his well-filled pocket book into the darkness and dismounted. The highwayman searched the farmer's pockets and finding no money put up his pistol and jogged down the road. On the following day Mr. Cummings returned to the spot and found his money.

The footkiller is needed in Lebanon county. Frank Undercuffer is an apprentice in the blacksmith shop of John Harper in Jackson township, and during a discussion with William Katzman remarked that he could not hit him with a loaded shotgun at a distance of forty feet. Katzman having a firm belief in his power told Undercuffer to take a position at that distance, and he would prove it. The young man did as he was told, and shortly afterwards received a heavy charge of shot in his legs. The shot were equally distributed and at present Undercuffer is satisfied to lie on his back.

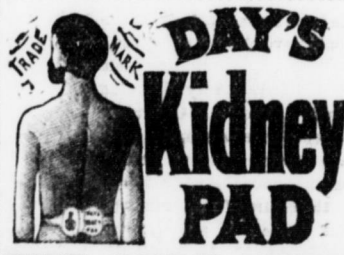
