#### Report of the Secretary of War.

The annual report of the Secretary of War concurs in the recommendation of General Sherman to increase the number of enlisted men to 25,000, and also to abandon minor posts throughout the west and northwest and concentrate the forces at permanent strategic points.

The Mississippi jetties are referred to as a complete success in opening an uninterrupted channel to the ocean from the Mississippi valley.

The secretary endorses the recommendation of the adjutant general in relation to placing the uniformed State militia upon the same footing in respect to its rules and forms as the regular forces, and calls attention to the necessity of providing by legislation for the organization, arming and disciplining of the militia.

Of coast defence the secretary says: From a personal inspection of many of the fortifications referred to by the chief of engineers I am able to emphasize his recommendations, and beg to state that their incomplete and defenceless condition is discreditable to the country. Judging from the history of all other nations, and the experience of our own, the United States will, notwithstanding our traditional pacific policy, find itself sooner or later at war with a maritime power. When that war comes it will come suddenly. There will be no time after its declaration to construct defences, either fixed or floating. Other nations have been for some years and are now constructing fast war steamers of enormous size, encased in iron armor up to two feet in thickness, and armed with rifled guns weighing up to one hundred tons, carrying shot of tons weight, fired with little short of a quarter of a ton of powder. It is found that the country does not appreciate the fact that after the declaration of war, a few days, or even hours, might bring these great engines of destruction to our coasts. It may be to New York, or Boston, Portland, or Baltimore, or New Orleans, or San Francisco, or any other point the enemy may select. No one can estimate the damage which may follow.

Governor James D. Williams died at 12:30 o'clock Sunday afternoon. He was taken ill on the day of the Presidential election but his illness was not considered dangerous until within the last three or four days. His disease was inflammation of the bladder, with which he has been afflicted for fifteen years.

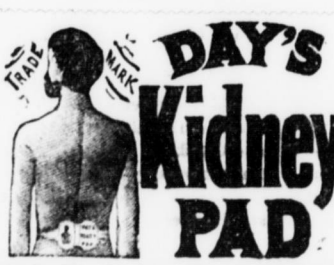
