Democratic Delegate Election and County Convention.

The Democratic voters of Centre county will meet at the regular place of holding the general election for their districts, on

Saturday, August 6, 1881, to elect delegates to the Democratic County Convention.

The election will open at two o'clock P. M. and close at six P. M.

The delegates chosen at the above time will meet in the Court House, at Bellefonte, on Tuesday, the 9th day of August, at two o'clock P. M., to nominate two candidates for Associate Judge; one candidate for Sheriff; one candidate for Prothonotary; one candidate for Treasurer; one candidate for Register; one candidate for Recorder; two candidates for County Commissioner; two candidates for Auditor; and to transact such other business as the interest of the party may require.

The number of delegates to which each district is entitled is as follows:

The delegate elections must be conducted strictly in accordance with the following rules:

1. The Democratic County Convention of Centre county shall be composed of one delegate for every fifty Democratic votes polled at the Presidential or gubernatorial election next preceding the convention.

The allotment of delegates to the several election districts in the county shall be made by the Standing Committee of the county at its first meeting in every alternate year succeeding the Presidential and gubernatorial elections, and shall be in proportion to the Democratic votes cast in each district at such elections.

2. The election for delegates to represent the different districts in the annual Democratic County Convention shall be held at the usual place of holding the general elections for each district, on the Saturday preceding the second Tuesday of August, in each and every year, beginning at two o'clock P. M., on said day and continuing until six o'clock P. M.

3. The said delegate elections shall be held by an election board, to consist of the member of county committee for each district and two other Democratic voters thereof, who shall be appointed or designated by the County Committee. In case any of the persons so constituting the board shall be absent from the place of holding the election for a quarter of an hour after the time appointed by Rule First for the opening of the same, his or their place or places shall be filled by an election, to be conducted viva voce, by the Democratic voters present at the time.

4. Every qualified voter of the district, who at the late general election voted the Democratic ticket, shall be entitled to a vote at the delegate election; and any qualified elector of the district who will pledge his word of honor to support the Democratic ticket at the next general election shall be permitted to vote at the delegate elections.

5. The voting at all delegate elections shall be by ballot; upon which ballot shall be written or printed the name or names of the delegate or delegates voted for, together with any instructions which the voter may desire to give the delegate or delegates. Each ballot shall be received from the person voting the same by a member of the election board, and by him deposited in a box or other receptacle provided for that purpose, to which box or other receptacle no person but members of the board shall have access.

6. No instructions shall be received or recognized unless the same be voted upon the ballot as provided in Rule Fourth, nor shall such instructions if voted upon the ballot, be binding upon the delegates, unless one-half or more of the ballots shall contain instructions concerning the same office. Whenever half or more of the ballots shall contain instructions concerning any office, the delegates elected at such elections shall be held to be instructed to support the candidate having the highest number of votes for such office.

7. Each election board shall keep an accurate list of the names of all persons voting at such elections, when the list of voters together with a full and complete re-

turn of such election, containing an accurate statement of the persons elected, delegates and all instructions voted, shall be certified by said board to the county commission, upon printed blanks to be furnished by the county convention.

8. Whenever from any district qualified Democratic voters, in numbers equal to five times the delegates which such district has in the county convention, shall complain in writing of an undue election or false return of delegates or of instructions, in which complaints the alleged facts shall be specifically set forth and verified shall be the affidavit of one or more persons, by such complainants shall have the right to contest the seat of such delegates or the validity of such instructions. Such complaint shall be heard by a committee of five delegates to be appointed by the president of the convention; which said committee shall proceed to hear the parties, their proofs and allegations, and as soon as may be report to the convention what delegates are entitled to seats therein, and what instructions are binding upon such delegates. Whereupon the convention shall proceed immediately upon the call of the year and may to adopt or reject the report of the contesting parties; in which call of the year and may the names of the delegates whose seats are contested, or whose instructions are disputed shall be omitted.

9. All delegates must reside in the district they represent. In case of absence or inability to attend, substitutions may be made from citizens of the district.

10. Delegates must obey the instructions given them by their respective districts, and, if violated, it shall be the duty of the president of the convention to cast the vote of such delegate or delegates in accordance with the instructions, and the delegate or delegates so offending shall be forthwith expelled from the convention, and shall not be eligible to any office or place of trust in the party for a period of two years.

11. In the convention, a majority of all voters shall be necessary to a nomination; and no person's name shall be excluded from the list of candidates until after the third ballot or vote, when the person receiving the least number of votes shall be omitted and struck from the roll, and so on at each successive vote until a nomination be made.

12. If any person who is a candidate for any nomination before a county convention shall be proven to have offered or paid any money or other valuable thing, or made any promise of a consideration or reward to any delegate for his vote, or to any person with a view of inducing or securing the votes of delegates, or if the same shall be done by any other person with the knowledge and consent of such candidate, the name of such candidate shall be immediately stricken from the list of candidates; or if such fact be ascertained after his nomination, shall be struck from the ticket and the vacancy supplied by a new nomination, and, in either case, such person shall be ineligible to any nomination by the convention, or to an election as a delegate thereafter. And in case it shall be alleged after the adjournment of the convention that any candidate put in nomination has been guilty of such acts or of any other fraudulent practices to obtain any nomination, the charges shall be investigated by the county committee, and such steps taken as the good of the party may require.

13. If any delegate shall receive any money or other valuable thing, or accept the promise of any consideration or reward to him or to any person for such candidate, as an inducement for his vote, upon proof of the fact to the satisfaction of the convention, such delegate shall be forthwith expelled, and shall not be received as a delegate to any further convention, and shall be ineligible to any party nomination.

14. Cases arising under the 8th, 12th and 13th rules shall have precedence over all other business in convention until determined.

15. That the term of the chairman of the county committee shall begin on the first day of January of each year.

16. That the delegates from the several boroughs and townships be authorized, in conjunction with the chairman of the county committee, to appoint the members of the committee for the various boroughs and townships.

The boards to hold the primary elections will be announced hereafter.

LETTER FROM WASHINGTON.

From our Regular Correspondent.

WASHINGTON, August 1, 1881.

Among the late political rumors is one to the effect that ex-Secretary Carl Schurz is to be made Minister to Germany. The story comes from Europe this time, and may be nothing more than a reproduction of what was said here before the close of the Hayes Administration. The appointment would be offensive to the German Government, and would not gratify many of our own citizens. Probably when the President recovers he will wish to show the people some of that good will which has been generally shown towards him and he knows very well that such an appointment would not be in that line at all. The Treasury is working vigorously in its effort to find out who sent the dynamite bombs from this country by steamship last week. The Secretary expects to be successful in this case, but says he sees no way of preventing exportations. The law is quite severe and will no doubt be made more so now, that the danger is demonstrated.

Congressman Carlisle, of Kentucky, is the first prominent member of the House to begin the discussion of the bond question. He demands a three per cent. bond and says it would be taken in this country. A change from three and a half to three per cent, on the "extended" bonds, and no others can be charged now, would effect a saving of about three millions a year in interest. Mr. Carlisle is a member of the Ways and Means committee and will urge this subject on the House early in the next session.

It will be remembered that Garland, Bayard and other Democrats rather reluctantly acted with their brethren last spring in preventing the election of officers in the Senate. They did so solely on the grounds that the Senate had an efficient Secretary and Sergeant-at-Arms. By the death of Mr. Burch, which occurred this week a vacancy in the principal office is created, and an election will probably take place immediately on the assembling of the Senate. The only question is as to whether it shall be before or after the swearing in of the Senators from New York. If before, a Democrat will be elected. If after, a Republican. If a Republican it will of course be the caucus nominee, Gorham, friend of Conkling, and enemy of the Administration. There is no instance recorded of a second nomination by caucus under such circumstances.

The President is apparently gaining rapidly. The physicians think so. They see no danger of another relapse, and are confident that he will steadily improve until finally restored to perfect health.

The Ohio Campaign.

THE DEMOCRATIC CANDIDATE HOPES FOR SUCCESS AND MAKES SOME REMARKS.

TOLEDO, July 28.—Gen. J. B. Steedman, chairman of the committee appointed by the Democratic State Convention to notify J. W. Bookwalter of his nomination for Governor, has received that gentleman's reply. Mr. Bookwalter, after acknowledging the honor and deprecating his unfitness to follow the great leaders who have preceded him, says he hopes for success from the inherent and persistent force of Democratic principles and the zeal and fidelity in their defense uniformly exhibited by the Democratic party of Ohio. He heartily concurs in the spirit and letter of the platform. He considers that the Legislature would not be justified in yielding to the dictation of corporations and monopolies entrenched in wealth as against the masses of the people, particularly the agricultural and mechanical classes, which have only numerical power without concentration or organization. With regard to the resolutions against mere summary legislation, Mr. Bookwalter says he does not understand that it implies hostility to national and political measures for the abatement of any evils with which society is afflicted. The preservation of social order and the restraint and control of elements of danger to the community which cannot be wholly removed, are properly within the scope of constitutional legislation. The declarations of the platform on the tariff question and on the relations of capital and labor meet his hearty approval.
