

A Clerk's Full Swing.

HOW THE GOVERNMENT PRINTING OFFICE HAS BEEN MANAGED FOR SOME TIME. From the Philadelphia Times.

WASHINGTON, October 6.—When the management of the Government Printing Office is looked into, if it ever is, there will be some developments by the side of which the corruption in the Treasury Department will be nowhere. It will be found that one Childs, an irresponsible clerk, has had full swing of an office running over a thousand employes; that this man has controlled contracts and manipulated bids at his own pleasure, and that Mr. Deffrees has admitted himself powerless to interfere. It will be found that this powerlessness began about the time that \$10,000 were taken from the office safe in broad daylight, which amount was repaid by Congress and the loss never covered. There were several of the Deffrees family of fast young men about the office at the time, but the safe-robbers were never discovered. It will be found that Childs kept one of Howgate's charmers on his office rolls, although her character was well known to him and to every woman in the printing office. It will be found that Deffrees has not rendered two months' service a year, but has quietly resided at Berkeley Springs, where the men in his employ were compelled to, at their own expense and loss of wages, to consult him, and when they were invariably turned back to Childs. This fellow worked the office on double time one week and the next furloughed half the force for want of appropriations and otherwise showed his gross incapacity, while Deffrees dare not remove him.

A True Bill.

GUILTEAU INDICTED IN ELEVEN MINUTELY DRAWN COUNTS.

WASHINGTON, October 9.—The indictment against Charles J. Guiteau for the murder of James A. Garfield, late President of the United States, was presented to the grand jury yesterday morning. The indictment embraces eleven counts and is drawn with great minuteness. Each count repeats the charge that Guiteau, feloniously, wilfully and of his malice aforethought, did kill and murder against the form of the statute in such case made and provided and against the peace and government of the United States. The variations are regarding the time and place of death and the court's jurisdiction, and are drawn so as to cover every possible loophole through which the prisoner might escape. For instance, the only variation in the fifth count is a change in the order of mention of the places in which death is said to have occurred, the county of Washington and District of Columbia being put first. The sixth count recites that the offence charged was committed in the Baltimore and Potomac railroad depot, in the city of Washington, which building stands at and the time stood on the ground belonging to and under the exclusive jurisdiction of the United States. The ninth count is varied by the introduction of the recital that the district in which the offence charged was committed constitutes a judicial circuit of the United States, and that the county of Monmouth and State of New Jersey, where the said James A. Garfield died, form part of a judicial circuit of the United States consisting of the District of Columbia. In all other respects this count is like the third.

At 12:45 the grand jury entered the Criminal Court room and presented the indictment against Guiteau indorsed "a true bill" and signed by Caleb Churchman, foreman.

A Physician's Suicide.

PLUNGING UNDER THE WHEELS OF AN ENGINE WHILE INSANE.

PITTSBURGH, October 7.—While a heavy locomotive of the Fort Wayne road was approaching the Federal street crossing in Allegheny to-day Engineer Evans noticed a well-dressed gentleman standing close to the track and intently looking at the engine. He was far enough from the track to be out of danger, and the engineer did not sound any alarm, but kept his eyes on the man, attracted by the peculiar staring look in his eyes. Just as the cow-catcher passed the man he stepped suddenly forward, stooped and thrust his head under the engine back of the truck wheels and immediately before the revolving driving wheels. The movement was so sudden and unexpected that there could be but one result. The engineer's hand was on the lever and the engine was reversed in a moment, but it was too late. The ponderous driving wheels rolled over the man's head and crushed his skull like paper. Death was instantaneous. An investigation showed that the suicide was Dr. Louis H. Christie, of Franklin, Pa. Last March Christie was attacked with softening of the brain. He was sent to Dixmont, but last month was thought to be recovered and was brought to the home of Dr. James H. Christie, of Allegheny. He was harmless and was allowed to roam at will. He had a large and lucrative practice in Franklin. He was 48 years old and single.

Killed While Ejecting a Drunken Man.

LOCK HAVEN, Pa., October 9.—A mysterious death occurred here at 10:30 last night. Jonas Zindle was the proprietor of the Farmers' Hotel on Church street. Samuel Blair, who was under the influence of liquor, had been quarreling in the barroom and Zindle walked him outside. Instantly there was a heavy thud heard on the pavement. Zindle's wife ran out and found her husband lying in the street. Blair was on his hands and knees, but got up and ran off. Mrs. Zindle called for help, and it was then found that Zindle was dead, the right side of his face being terribly bruised. Blair was arrested at his home at midnight. An inquest was commenced to-day, but it was adjourned until to-morrow.

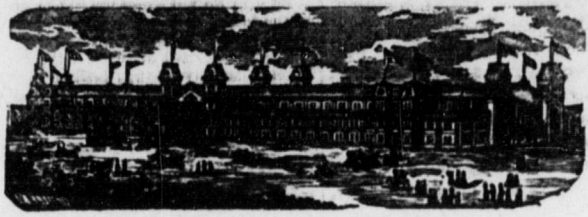
