

STATE NEWS.

A company is being organized to erect glass works at Blairsville.

The Taylor Iron Works are to be removed from York to Chambersburg.

The South Erie Iron Works are to be enlarged to accommodate increasing business.

Rich gold and silver ores are said to have been dug up near Garland, Warren county.

The York Dispatch says there is a prospect that a porcelain pottery will be started at that place.

At Chester on Sunday evening Rev. A. G. Thomas preached a memorial sermon in honor of those killed by the explosion.

The 3 year old son of James Ingram, living at Clarendon, Erie county, fell into a tub of boiling water on Thursday and was scalded to death.

The Councils of Williamsport met in joint session on Saturday evening and cast thirty-three ballots in an unsuccessful effort to elect a City Solicitor.

A washwoman living in Franklin, Venango county, is reported by the Oil City Derrick to have twenty-eight children. She is not yet 50 years old.

Bennettville Trexler, a wealthy farmer of Berks county, committed suicide on Sunday by hanging himself. He was aged forty-two years and leaves a wife and two children.

The Pennsylvania Board of Revision of Taxes have decided that parsonages and other church property not forming an integral part of a church are subject to be taxed and will be assessed.

Hopes are raised high over a gold and silver mine discovered at Garland, Warren county, Pa. An assay of specimens shows a yield of \$80 gold, \$165 silver and \$8 of lead to the ton of ore.

The students of the Lewisburg University have elected Wayne MacVeagh to deliver the annual address at the next University Commencement, which occurs in the latter part of June next.

Speaking of the result of the election in Philadelphia, the Press declares that "the ring-smashing machine tracking vote has just begun his work and got his hand in practice so to speak."

The first annual banquet of the Historical Society of Montgomery county was held in Norristown on Tuesday night. Colonel Bean presided. There were about one hundred guests present.

Horace Gross, an employee of the Pennsylvania Agricultural Works, York Pa., had his arm caught in the machinery on Saturday and crushed in a horrible manner. The arm was amputated.

Congressman James M. Campbell, of the Seventeenth district, has appointed the 22d of March as the day and Johnston as the place for the competitive examination of applicants for a West Point cadetship.

The annual address before the literary societies of Muhlenburg College, at Allentown, will be delivered by Mr. Charles E. Smith, editor of the Philadelphia Press.

Mrs. Louisa Walters, aged 36 years, was fatally burned at Williamsport on Monday night in trying to save her daughter, whose clothing caught fire from an exploded lamp. She died on Tuesday. The daughter will recover.

The families of Richard Harlow and William Burchell, of Scranton, were poisoned on Friday evening and Saturday morning by eating hoghead cheese obtained from a local pork dealer. Fortunately no fatal cases are reported.

The Rockley paper mills of J. B. Broome, near Coatesville, and an adjoining dwelling, were burned before daylight on Thursday morning, by the explosion of a lamp. Elwood Hilton, an employee, sleeping in an upper story, was burned to death.

The Hollidaysburg Standard says that there are canvassers in Indiana county securing large quantities of land ostensibly for oil tests, but the farmer finds out when too late that he has parted with good mineral land at a low figure.

Mrs. H. L. Lebling, a very poor woman of Latrobe, Westmoreland county, who was recently left a sum of money by a relative in Germany, has received the first instalment, amounting to \$19,000, and \$10,000 more is expected in a short time.

The house of Michael Ulrich, near Highspire, Dauphin county, which was robbed of a large amount of money several nights ago, is said to yet contain considerable cash hidden away in the ceilings. This is all to be deposited in bank hereafter. The amount taken is supposed to have been about \$1000.

A very sad story comes from Lancaster, where the Hon. H. C. Rogers has been committed to jail for vagrancy. He is a lawyer, and has been a master of several languages. He was a member of the State Constitutional convention of Pennsylvania of 1837, and Minister to Sardinia under Martin Van Buren, but is now in his dotage.
