

GENERAL NEWS.

Quinn, Assistant Secretary of the Land League, was removed to Armagh. Paris, March 24.—In the Senate today the Compulsory Education Bill was passed. Brennan, late Secretary of the Land League, was removed from Kilmalham Jail to Kilkenny. The Moulders Union of Troy, N. Y., ordered a strike, to take effect in all the stove foundries except four. Herman Hildren, who murdered his stepfather and shot his mother, but not fatally, escaped from the Milwaukee jail. The President has approved the joint resolution appropriating \$150,000 for the benefit of the sufferers from the Mississippi floods. London March 24.—Gladstone's proposal to make a grant of £10,000 per annum to Prince Leopold was carried by a vote 387 to 42. Forster has gone to Dublin for the purpose of consulting with the Prison Board in regard to a relaxation of the confinement of suspects. The address of congratulation to Archbishop McCabe from the Irish members of Parliament is refused the signature of the Land League members. At the sale of the Montgomery White Sulphur Springs property at Lynchburg, Va., the hotel porch fell, killing one man and seriously injuring twelve others. WASHINGTON, March 25.—The President will not act on the Chinese bill until the question has been considered by the Cabinet, and examined in all its bearings. A dispatch from Mentone states that Prince Leopold, while out walking to day had a fall, injuring him but slightly. It is stated his marriage day will be postponed. CITY OF MEXICO, March 24.—The Government has deposited \$111,823 with the Monte De Piedad for the payment of the next installment of the American debt. The Grand Jury at Omaha, Neb., have reported an indictment for assault with intent to kill, against President Walsh and Committeeman Shannon, of the Labor Union. HAVRE, March 25.—A life boat while proceeding to the rescue of the crew of a sloop during a gale to day capsized, and both crews, numbering nineteen persons, were drowned. Barnum has lived seventy-two years, and wants to live seventy years longer. The fact that there will be no circus in the next world appears to have discouraged the veteran showman. The President has signed the commissions of John Russel Young, to be Minister to China; Cornelius Logan, to be Minister to Chili, and Charles R. Coster to be Pension Agent at New York. Jersey justice is again heard from. Palmer, ex Auditor of Newark who robbed the city of \$220,000, gets twenty years at hard labor in the State's prison, despite family and political influence. Both branches of the New York Legislature passed resolutions requesting the President to commute the punishment of Sergeant Mason to a dismissal from the regular army of the United States. St. PETERSBURG, March 24.—The Jews of this city have been ordered to close their shops and to discontinue business. They will be permitted to live here but will not be allowed to follow any profession. London, March 24.—The French Budget Committee is largely favorable to Say's financial proposals, there being eighteen members in favor of the proposals, eight in favor with reservations, and four opposed to it. Colonel John Miller, of Sharpshurg, Washington county, Maryland, was born and has slept in the same house and in the same room for ninety-seven years, and is still hale and hearty. He gained the title of colonel in the war of 1812. The employees of the Glen Cove starch factory at Flushing, L. I., struck for an increase of wages on Saturday, and on Sunday they took possession of the establishment turning out the proprietors. Sheriff Wright was notified, and sent twenty-five special officers to arrest the strikers. Reports from Natchez, Vicksburg, New Orleans and various other points report further breaks in the levees and increased damage by the floods. Although the waters have fallen at some points they have risen at others, and the position is far from reassuring. WASHINGTON, March 26.—The funeral ceremonies of Rear Admiral Gustavus H. Scott took place at 3 o'clock this afternoon from his late residence on G street. The funeral was largely attended by the friends of the family and officers of the army and navy in this city. Two great theatre fires have just been added to the disasters of this kind in Europe—one at St. Petersburg and the other at Marseilles—both occurring when the buildings were occupied, though fortunately with little or no loss of life. The lessons of the Vienna disaster do not seem to have sunk very deep. The Fourth Battalion of Federal troops has been ordered to Loconusco, near the Guatemala border. This action was taken by the Government in order to be prepared for any emergency that may arise in regard to the settlement of boundary dispute between Mexico and Guatemala and to give protection to settlers. On receipt of information that the family of Sergeant Mason was in distress, the Philadelphia Press sent a correspondent to Virginia to inquire into Mrs. Mason's condition, and at once began collecting ten-cent contributions. The correspondent reports that the needs of "Betty and the baby" are as represented. The Press fund has already over 10,000 contributors 6,000 of whom were added Saturday, raising the fund to \$600.
