Settling the Contested Election Cases.

 WASHINGTON, March 27.—The committee on elections to-morrow will probably have ready two reports. One will be in favor of seating Bisbee, contestant for Finley's seat, from the Second Florida district, and the other will dismiss, without prejudice, the case of Stotbrand vs. Aiken, of South Carolina. Early next week the case of Lynch vs. Chalmers will be concluded. Chairman Calkins is writing the report, and it will recommend the seating of Lynch and throwing out of Chalmers. The case of McKey, of South Carolina, will also be completed in a few days by the report in favor of the contestant, McKey, who has a strong case. There are at least two other Republican contestants from the South who have good cases, namely, Lee, of South Carolina, contesting Richardson's seat, and Smith, of Mississippi, contesting Shelley's. Lowe, Greenbacker, is considered as having a fairly strong case against Wheeler, Democrat, from Alabama. The heaviest case is that of Sessinghaus vs. Frost, of Missouri. There are 3,500 printed pages of testimony, and fifty men are at work on it.
