Prohibition in Centre County.

The readers of the DEMOCRAT during the past month have been kept posted in relation to the movements of those actively engaged in bringing before the people the necessity and practicability of a prohibitory clause being appended to the State constitution forbidding the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors, within the limits of the Commonwealth, forever Meetings were held throughout the county, branch organizations established, executive or vigilance committees appointed and delegates to the County Convention elected. These delegates met in pursuance to the call of Mr. W. D. Blackburn, a member of the State Constitutional Amendment Association, in 'the Court House, at Bellefonte, Friday 28th ultimo. One significant feature of the convention was the participation of many of Centre county's most respectable and influential citizens.

Friends of temperance anxiously awaited the action of this deliberative body and were ready and willing to support any measures it might see fit to adopt. The work was well done, all having been accomplished that was originally intended to be effected, which will be fully adduced by the publication of the preamble and constitution in a future issue.

In this connection it might be safe to remark that the only progress made in these aggressive movements is the work of the untiring, determined, conservative element; those who after due consideration take a stand, and are satisfied to have the work move slowly provided the advancement be sure and permanent.

It is barely possible to enforce the existing laws controlling the sale of liquors, and there are many others that might supplement them with good effect. As all licenses are applied for as necessary to accommodate the traveling public, let them be granted with permission to sell only to traveling men, or tax the consumers instead of the vender. Have each person who drinks pay \$5, per annum, publish the names of all who take out licenses, twice a year, and allow all who please to sell, but only to those holding valid certificates of intemperance.
