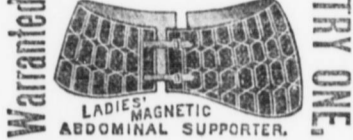

The German Method of Preserving Butter.

In a recent number of the Milch Zeitung, Dr. Fleischman, Germany's highest authority on matters pertaining to the dairy, discourses on "Preserved Butter"—not butter preserved by the addition of some antiseptic, but by its own good quality, secured by extreme care in its manufacture.

It has a golden color, much like that of fully ripened oat straw. When the flat side of a knife blade is gently pressed down on its surface minute drops of clear brine should appear, not in the least milky; and no butter, but only droplets of the same clear brine, should adhere to the back side of the tryer when drawn out; these qualities should be exhibited when the sample of butter has stood long enough in a cool room at a temperature of about 56 degrees Fahrenheit to take this temperature to the centre of the mass.

Rotation of Crops. Rotation of crops is rendered necessary, says the Country Gentleman, not as formerly supposed, because the soil becomes exhausted of some particular element, or becomes unwholesome for that particular plant, but because insects and diseases accompany the plant are special to it, the eggs or spores of which are left in the soil to attack the same crop the succeeding year with increased power.

Assorting Produce. Many farmers and their wives, err greatly in their methods of sending products to market. Fine specimens of fruit and poor ones, large potatoes and small ones, are thrown together, and as a consequence the best is brought down to the grade of the poorest and is sold at a corresponding price.

Tip End Grains of Corn. That the grains from the tip ends of ears of corn produced the better yield in comparison with those from the butt and center led Dr. Sturtevant to investigate further in order to discover a reason. His explanation is that the well-formed grains on the tips of the ears had a fuller chance for development in their normal shape, as a grain of corn, if left with ample room, swells on each side and assumes a round form, which is prevented in the centre of the cob, where the grains are flat.

An extensive cattle and poultry raiser in Iowa states that he has no trouble with vermin on his beasts and birds when they have a chance to "dust themselves" and have an opportunity to eat onions once a week.

It is stated that nine-tenths of the apples exported are Baldwins.

Value of Manure.

It should be remembered that the value of manure from all animals varies greatly with the character of the food, and that hog manure should be so valued from the fact that he is also carnivorous, devouring dead animals and grubs when running at large, and when shut up in a pen eating bones and refuse meats, bread and all the refuse from the table.

Mulching Wheat. At a meeting of the Elmira Farmers' Club the benefits from mulching wheat was discussed, and Mr. McCann stated that he found that a simple mulching of buckwheat straw gave good results. As the object is to give protection against the rigors of winter, the mulch should be applied before the ground freezes, if possible, or even after, but not before the plants have made some growth.

Cultivating the Peach. Prof. Charles A. Goessman, who has given the cultivation of the peach much investigation, is of the opinion that animal manures, as usually applied to the soil where fruit trees are set, are the source of disease and death to the peach tree. They may stimulate for a while, but finally cause disease. He recommends the following formula for an acre as the best fertilizer for a peach orchard: Superphosphate, 450 pounds; muriate of potash (high grade), 180 pounds; sulphate of magnesia (crude), 100 pounds. The application should be made annually.

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The great disadvantage of cold storage comes from the fact that fruit thus retarded must be used as soon as taken out.

FARM experiences are worth nothing unless from them we learn how we can make a failure, or how we were able to succeed. Hence the "double how" is what is needed to make things clear.

A TREE is to be grafted when it is of a poor kind, and we wish to change the kind of fruit it bears. If the tree is very large it is well to graft only the lower third of the branches the first year. The best time for apple and pear trees is just as the buds are swelling.

It is stated as a fact for farmers that the seed of the sunflower is the only remedy ever discovered for the cure of founder in horses. Immediately on discovering that young horses are founder, work about a pint of the whole seed into his feed, and it will effect a perfect cure.

MANY horses are actually killed by kindness. Letting them stand in the stable from one week's end to another without any exercise of any kind, because they might hurt themselves if let run loose, is very injurious. To keep them in the right condition it is necessary that they be exercised every day.

An experienced farmer says that oats should be soaked sufficiently to swell before feeding them to stock. When soaked, the husk is partly torn away, and facility of digestion increased. Poultry will carefully pick out the soaked grains from the dry when allowed a preference in the matter.

It has been discovered that there is less potash in the leaves of diseased grapevines than in healthy specimens. The lack of potash is made up by an excess of lime. It is possible that lack of mineral fertilizers may be the cause of many diseases of trees and other plants, and that farmers and gardeners may yet have to consult the vegetable and grain doctor.

SHEEP that are dropping their lambs require close attention; the least neglect often proves fatal. While sheep need protection from cold storms and winds they will not bear confinement as well as many other animals; they should therefore be provided with a spacious shed, open to the south, where they can stand in the sun and have good air, and yet be protected from cold winds in fair weather and kept dry during storms.

The Drovers' Journal says that with all the dangers from disease, hog-raising, though it requires more labor, is really the most profitable business which farmers can engage in where corn is a sure crop. It is surprising, also, how many farmers there are who seem to wholly ignore the fact that any other food than dry corn is suitable for swine when it is within their power to keep such stock half or two-thirds of the year on food not nearly so expensive.
