The trick of importation and coloniza tion had been tried on a much larger scale, but without success, in 1876, when I was also in Indiana. In 7880 the means used to carry the state were different. The chief dependence was put on Greenbackers, not on colonists and repeaters.

"In the Garfield year, I think, not more than 150 outsiders were sent to Indiana from the east for these purposes. One party, as I remember, consisted of 45 men from Baltimore and Wilmington. There were gangs from Philadelphia, Pittsburg and other eastern cities. The imported Republicans were letter carriers, petty office holders and ward workers in the city where they belonged. Their duties were to intimidate Democratic voters, to brawl. create disturbances and knock men down if necessary, to personate Democratic voters and to repeat as often as possible.
