LEMONT, PA., Jan. 11, 1884. WORTHY EDITOR :- It is always a delight to me to find anything in your col. umns that takes me back to the dear old past when I was a boy. I seem to live over again my boyhood days, and almost forget, for the time being, that the sands of my life are nearly run.

Thinking that a few words from my pen night interest others, especially aged acquaintances, I wish to mention a few facts concerning my early life and surroundings. I was born in 1808, near the place where Green's run empties into Bald Eagle creek At the age of three years I went to live with my uncle. John Smith, on the farm now owned by Jacob C. Smith. It was here, in my first new trousers, I was urged to run a race with my uncle, and, to my great delight, beat him. Here, too, caught my first fish-chubs-with a bent pin hook. My play-house was the "old Green cabin" that stood by Green's Run. both named from the Indian, Green. It was here that deer could be seen in droves. pasturing upon our wheat. Foxes caught our geese and chickens ; wolves killed our sheep, and wildcats our lambs. But what was worse than all this was the ravages made by a worm. It was no army worm there were not many. But the effect was appalling. It not only consumed our fruit State, and ranks among the first. and grain, but destroyed our domestic peace and prosperity, in our once happy homes.
