 EDITORS CENTRE DEMOCRAT:
 Dear Sirs—In this part of the county we daily hear inquiry made about who shall the Democracy of the county nominate as candidates for the Legislature. Every other man you meet expresses his fear for the success of the ticket if we shall follow our usual custom of giving two terms. There, no doubt, are good men in the county who would go to the Legislature if the people would ask them. These very men put their refusal to be candidates on the ground that they can not afford to get into a contest for the position. This is no doubt so, and is the very reason why the people should seek them out and give them, unsought, the nomination. Such men are fit to go to the Legislature.
 What your correspondent says in the paragraph above quoted is based upon what a few Democrats scattered here and there in the several townships of the county are saying, but when he says "Every other man you meet expresses his fear for the success of the ticket if we shall follow our usual custom of giving two terms," it is scarcely borne out by the facts. The letter from which the above extract is taken has evidently been written by some enthusiastic friend and supporter of John A. Woodward, because the balance of the letter after assuming the facts to be as stated, eulogizes Mr. Woodward and says the Democracy can not "do better than to determine that they will send him to represent them in the next legislature."
 I do not propose to advocate the cause of any candidate for political honors; but it has been a long recognized custom of the Democratic party to give members of the legislature at least two terms.
 The reason of this custom is that a new man entering the legislature for his first term is comparatively unacquainted with the men of this body; he is not familiar with parliamentary rules, and the routine work of legislation, and is scarcely ever placed on important committees.
 It takes him at least one term to gain sufficient experience to enable him to properly represent his constituency.
 In his second term he has had experience, has made acquaintances and if of fair ability, will have an opportunity of fairly representing his constituents with credit to himself.
 What has Mr. Hunter or Mr. Meyer done that they should be cut short with one term? Are there any charges of corruption or dereliction of duty preferred against them? I have heard of none.
 If there be none, then why should they not be returned?
 They have more experience than any new man who has ever served in that body can possibly have. Their acquaintance with their associates will be greater than that of any new men; they will stand a better chance of being placed on important committees than new men will, and for these reasons will better serve the people.
 The coming session of the legislature will be an important one to the Democracy of this county. Legislative, Senatorial and Congressional apportionment bills must be passed. The chances are that the Democrats will be in the minority in both branches, hence the importance of the best experience to represent us and maintain our just rights. If Hunter and Meyer are not to be returned why send men of even less experience than they. If they can not be returned as D. M. your correspondent thinks they can not, I would suggest a number of names of Democrats of experience in legislation, who are competent and will do credit to themselves and their constituents.
 On the Pennsylvan side we have Hon. J. P. Gephart, and Hon. Fredrick Kurtz. On the other side Hon. Jno. H. Orvis, Hon. C. T. Alexander, Hon. S. T. Shugert and Hon. P. Gray Meek, from among whom a selection can be made that will do credit to the Democracy of the county, as they have all held the office and were true and faithful servants.


