#### Democratic Rules.

The following rules are furnished for the guidance of members of the County Committee in holding the delegate election on Saturday, August 9, 1884, as well as for the information of persons elected as delegates as for the information of persons elected as delegates.

1. The Democratic County Convention of Centre county shall be composed of ene delegate for every fifty Democratic votes polled at the Presidential or Gubernatorial election next preceding the convention. The allotment of delegates to the several election districts in the county shall be made by the Standing Committee of the county at its first meeting in every alternate year succeeding the Presidential and Gubernatorial elections and shall be in proportion to the Democratic votes cast in each district at such elections.

2. The election for delegates to represent the different county in the county of the different county is a such district at such elections.

2. The election for delegates to represent the differ-2. The election for delegates to represent the different districts in the annual Democratic County Convention shall be held at the usual place of holding the general elections for each district, on the Saturday preceding the second Tuesday of August in each and every year, beginning at two o'clock, p.m. on said day and continuing until six o'clock, p.m. The delegates so elected shall meet in County Convention in the Court House, at Bellefonte, on the Tuesday following

Court House, at Bellefonte, on the Tuesday following at two o'clock p.m.

3d. The said delegate elections shall be held by an election board, to consist of the member of county committee for each district and two other bemocratic voters thereof, who shall be appointed or designated by the County Committee. In case any of the persons so constituting the board shall be absent from the place of holding the election for a quarter of an hour after the time appointed by Rule First for the opening of the same, his or their place or places shall be filled by an election, to be conducted viva voce, by the Democratic voters present at that time.

4th. Every qualified voter of the district, who at
the late general election voted the Democratic ticket
shall be entitled to vote at the delegate election; and
any qualified elector of the district who will pledge his
word of honor to support the Democratic ticket at
the next general election shall be permitted to vote
at the delegate elections.

5th. The voting at all delegate elections; shall be
by ballot; upon which ballot shall be written or printed the name or names of the delegate or delegates voted
for, together with any instructions which the voter
may desire to give the delegate or delegates. Each
ballot shall be received from the person voting the
same by a member of the election board, and by him
deposited in a box or other receptacle provided for
that purpose, to which box or other receptacle ne
person but members of the board shall have access.

6. No instructions shall be received or recognized 6. No instructions shall be received or recognized unless the same be voted upon the bailot as provided in Rule Fourth, nor shall such instructions if voted upon the ballot be binding upon the delegates, unless one-half or more of the ballots shall contain instructions concerning the same office. Whenever half or more of the ballots shall contain instructions concerning any office, the delegates elected at such elections shall be held to be instructed to support the candidates having the highest number of votes for such office. rotes for such office.

7th. Each election board shall keep an accurate list of the names of all persons voting at such elections, when the list of voters together with a full and complete return of such election, containing an accurate statement of the persons elected delegates and all instructions voted shall be certified by said board to the county convention upon printed blanks to be furnished by the county committee.

Sth. Whenever from any district qualified Democratic voters in numbers equal to five times the delegates which such district has in the country convention, shall complain in writing of an un-ine elec-

legates which such district has in the country convention, shall complain in writing of an unite election of false return of delegates or of instructions, in which complaints the alleged facts shall be specifically set forth and verified by the affidavit of one or more pesons such complainants shall have the right to contes the seat of such delegates or the validity of such instructions. Such complaint shall be hard by a committee of five delegates to be appointed by the president of the convention; which said committee shall proceed to hear the parties, their proofs and allegations, and as soon as may be report to the convention what delegates are entitled to seats there in and what instructions are binding upon such delegates. Whereupon the convention shall proceed immediately upon the call of the yeas and nays to adopt or reject the report of the contesting parties in which call of the year and nays the names of the delegates whose seats are contested or whose instructions are

9th All delegates must reside in the district they present. In case of absence or inability to atlend abstitutions may be made from citizens of the dis-

19th. Delegates must obey the instructions given 10th. Delegates must obey the instructions given them by their respective districts, and, if violated it shall be the duty of the president of the convention to cast the vote of such delegate or delegates in accordance with the instructions and the delegate or delegates so offending shall be forthwith expelled from the convention, and shall not be eligible to any office or place of trust in the party for a period of two years.

Ith. In the convention, a majority of all voters shall be necessary to a nomination; and no person's name shall be excluded from the list of candidates until after the third bailot or vote when the person receiving the least number of votes shall be omitted and struck from the roll, and so on at each successive vote until a nomination be made.

12th. If any person who is a candidate for any nomination before a county convention shall be proven to have offered or paid any money or other valuable thing, or made any promise of a consideration or reward to any delegate for his vote, or to any person with a view of inducing or securing the votes of delegates, or if the same shall be done by any other peason with the knowledge and consent of such candidate the name of such candidates shall be immediately stricken from the list of candidates; or if such fact be ascertained after his nomination, shall be struck from the ticket and the vacancy supplied by a new nomination, and in either case such person shall be including be to any nomination by the convention, or to an election as a delegate thereafter. And in case it shall be alleged after the adjournment of the convention that any candidate put in nomination has been guilty of such acts, or of any other fraudulent practices to obtain such nomination, the charges shall be investigated by the county committee and such steps taken as the good of the party may require.
