### BRICK POMEROY INDICTED

By the Denver Grand Jury on Charges of Embezziement.

DENVER, Col., Oct. 1.-Among five indictments returned by the grand jury are two against Mark M. Pomeroy, better known as "Brick" Pomeroy, charging him with criminal acts in connection with his mining scheme known as the Atlantic and Pacific tunnel. While residing here Pomeroy advertised the scheme in his weekly paper, presenting bills therefor to the com-pany, of which he was the president, in which it is alleged he overcharged the company about \$6,000. This and similar alleged acts resulted in the finding of indictments of embezziement. His mining scheme has been generally viewed with disfavorahere, but many eastern people have invested in it. Considerable money has been spent in the tunnel, without finding anything valuable. The stockholders lately became suspici and brought suit to oust Pomeroy, which is still penting. He then sold his paper here, which has vigorously labored in the new hands to expose his alleged criminal acts.

In answering the complaint in the suit, which has been brought by Thomas Moulton, Pomeroy is charged with perjury. The grand jury has also indicted him on this charge. A warrant has been issued for his arrest, and Gov. Grant has made out the proper papers to bring him here from New York, where he is at present.
