Friday, Sept. 28. Gov. Hoody has resigned W. Richardson, sentenced to be hanged in Cincinnati, for twenty days. Ex-United States Senator Nesmith, of Oregon, has become insane and has been placed in an asylum.

Saturday, Sept. 27. John W. Garrett, president of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, is dead. San Francisco is excited over a case of leprosy from the Sandwich Islands.

Monday, Sept. 29. After being on strike a year the Cincinnati stove molders have gone back to work. Ten thousand people witnessed the parade of the striking cigarmakers in Binghamton, N. Y., on Friday.

Tuesday, Sept. 30. Prayers have been offered in the Petersburg, Va., churches for rain. Jake Gaudner, of St. Louis, defeated George Hosmer, the orator, at St. Louis on Sunday.

At a Republican meeting in Fredericktown, Pa., on Saturday night, Alfred Dougherty and E. R. Deems quarreled, and Dougherty fatally stabbed Deems. Dougherty has been arrested.

Wednesday, Oct. 1. The Cleveland firebugs still continue their nefarious work. The English revenue for the present quarter shows a decrease of \$2,500,000.

Thursday, Oct. 2. The public debt was reduced last month over \$12,000,000. It is announced that the Commercial cable will open for business on the 10th inst.

Friday, Oct. 3. A very destructive forest fire is raging along the line of the Norfolk and Western railroad in Danville county, about six miles from Petersburg, Va.

Saturday, Oct. 4. A cable dispatch was received at Harvard college observatory yesterday announcing the discovery of an asteroid of the thirteenth magnitude by Palisa, at Vienna.
