

The Competitor of the Pennsylvania Central Railroad Smothered.

PHILADELPHIA, July 19.—After all the talk, the project for another trunk line through Pennsylvania has been smothered. On Friday General George Magee, a prominent director of the South Pennsylvania Railroad, H. McK. Twombly, a director of the Beech Creek Railroad and a son-in-law of William H. Vanderbilt, and President Roberts, of the Pennsylvania Railroad, met Vice President Thomson, of the Pennsylvania, at his house in Merion, and had a long consultation regarding the settlement of the trunk-line war. It is learned that the result was that Mr. Twombly, representing Vanderbilt, and General Magee agree to do everything in their power to effect a transfer of the South Pennsylvania Railroad to the Pennsylvania Railroad Company. The conditions are that the Pennsylvania shall guarantee to the South Pennsylvania people 3 per cent interest on the money that has been expended in the construction of the latter road. There was some talk of a possible future extension of the South Pennsylvania Road for the use of the purchasing company, but the actual agreement made was as above stated.

A gentleman who is fully acquainted with the affairs of the negotiating lines, and who has an inside knowledge of the progress so far made, said yesterday that the Pennsylvania Railroad demands that it shall gain control of the Beech Creek road, and that failing to accomplish this it will not conclude any agreement with the Vanderbilt interests.

This being the case, inquiry was made as to the feeling of the Directors of the Beech Creek Road on the question of a transfer of the road to the Pennsylvania control, and it was learned that ex-Senator or William A. Wallace President of the Beech Creek Road is very much opposed to such an arrangement. President Wallace has given much time and work to the interests of his road, and it is a matter of personal pride to him to keep it an independent corporation. Furthermore he did much to start the road as an opposition to the Pennsylvania road in the coal regions, and he does not wish to have it absorbed by the very company it started out to fight. He will probably be overruled, however, as of the Directors of the road five openly favor giving the Pennsylvania all it wants, and two others, who are undecided, are expected to go the same way.

The reasons that the Pennsylvania is so determined to secure control of the Beech Creek are as follows: The Beech Creek railroad runs from Jersey Shore west to Gazzam, a distance of 120 miles. Gazzam is on the western slope of the Allegheny Mountains. The road crosses the Alleghenies at an easy grade of about fifty feet to the mile. The steep part is a grade of fifty-two feet. By cutting two short tunnels the grade can be reduced to forty-six feet to the mile. This is by far the lightest grade into the Clearfield and Tyrone coal fields. The only way the Pennsylvania has of reaching them at present is at a grade of 146 feet to the mile. The importance of the Beech Creek's light grade can be best understood when it is stated that one locomotive on the Beech Creek road can transport as much coal from these fields as four locomotives on the Pennsylvania's line. The Beech Creek line runs through forty miles of coal country. The Clearfield Coal Company is closely allied to the Beech Creek railroad company, the officers being almost identical in the two corporations. This coal company owns 20,000 acres of coal land near the village of Peale, on the line of the road, fifty eight miles from Jersey Shore.

In May the road carried 71,000 tons of coal. In the present depressed state of business it is claimed that the Beech Creek Road can earn ten per cent on the investment. The road was built on a cash basis. It was built of heavy steel rail and has a stone ballast throughout.

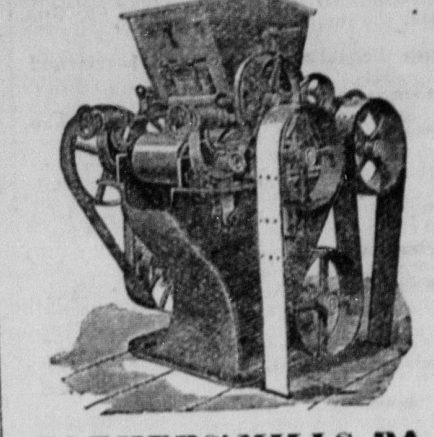
