The Burial Case.

The steel case which contain the remains of General Grant is made of Cheop's steel and weighs 380 pounds. It is 967 inches long, 40 inches wide and 31 inches high. The steel is one. half inch in thickness. The case is composed of six pieces. The rivets by which the ends are fastened together are five-eights of an inch thick, and are place two inches spart, and are what are known as button-headed on the bottom, where they are fastened. On the inside of the case three iron rollers are permanently secured to the bottom, and three wooden rollers on each side to assist in placing the coffis in position. On the edges wedre the different pieces are rivited together the steel is one inch thick. On one side of the case is a silver; late with the inscription : "U. S. Grant : died July 23d, 1885."


