Philadelphia, Oct. 25.—The different steel companies having offices in this city report that the demand for steel rails has greatly increased since the combination was formed for limiting the production and maintaining the prices. They also report that they have looked all the orders they can fill this year at least 10,000 tons for delivery next year. The price is steadily maintained at \$31, against \$27.50, which was the ruling price before the combination was formed. The demand is all from this country, but it is believed that a large number of orders will be received from the Chinese Empire, where the active construction of railroad has been ordered, unless they are underbid by the European combination of steel rail-makers.
