

The Springfield Lockout.

SPRINGFIELD, O., March 4.—The wholesale discharge of Knights of Labor from the East Street Champion Reaper Works caused a great sensation in this city. Many men when paid off were offered their positions back again if they would agree to sign an iron-clad agreement renouncing membership in the Knights of Labor.

The Champion Harvester Company is advertising in many papers throughout the State for "good loyal non-union men." The Springfield mechanics have appointed committees to attend all trains and meet the working-men who apply. They will explain the situation to them and try to persuade them to staying away.

The officers of the company positively refuse to take back any of the men who originally demanded 10 per cent advance. The number of locked out men is 425, and the number of men now out in Springfield is 1,100, representing a population of 4,000 people.

The Knights of Labor in other factories of the city will not be called out, as feared, and the trouble will be confined to the East street works and the Champion Malleable Iron Company. It is said that contracts are already being made for malleable iron from other works.

It is rumored that a number of Knights of Labor was discharged from the factory of the Champion Machine Company in addition to those discharged at the East Street Reaper Works, and that a list of all the employes of the Champion Bar and Knife Works who are Knights of Labor, or who sympathize with them, have been prepared with a view to dismissal.

The Knights of Labor have held large meetings. The discharged employes have received many offers of help from business men and others. Only a few outside men have come in, and a fewer still have gone to work. It is clear that the Whiteleys intend to run their entire business independent of the Knights of Labor regardless of consequence.

El Paso, Tex., March 7.—A duel with pistols between Toinid Alvarez and Senor Paradez, has been fought in the suburbs of Chihuahua, three shots being fired by each. Paradez received three wounds, and it is believed will die from his injuries. The first two shots fired at Alvarez missed him, but the third struck him in the forehead, killing him instantly.

JACKSON, Mich., March 7.—An eccentric character named John Gaunt, a tramp printer, is under arrest as a mendicant. Before the war he, with two others, started the Philadelphia Age. He went to the war and served through it. He came to Michigan fifteen years ago and worked as a printer.

The Killing of Mingo Jack.

EATONTOWN, N. J., March 7.—An ominous silence rates over this little town to-day. The excitement caused by the lynching of Mingo Jack has abated somewhat. During the day it was rumored that the detectives employed to ferret out the lynchers had discovered an important clue. Last evening a farmer named Suedeker, while intoxicated, inadvertently made a few remarks which the detectives regard as an important clue to the lynchers.

The dead negro's body was taken last night to a room in the rear of the village drug store. It was viewed by many people during the day. Coronors Van Woert and Smith have decided to allow a post-mortem examination to be made to-morrow morning. It is absolutely necessary to establish the cause of the negro's death. It is now the impression that he was clubbed to death before being strung up from the trausom grating.

The home of Miss Herbert, whom Mingo Jack assaulted, has been besieged by visitors all day long. Farmer Herbert has been congratulated repeatedly on the speedy justice administered to the black reprobate.

Queer Strike at Pittsburg.

PITTSBURG, March 7.—President Smith, of the American Flintglass Workers' Association, to-day ordered a strike at Macbeth's glass works on grounds which involved two of the greatest labor organizations in the world and questions of national importance. Some weeks ago some of the men at Macbeth's withdrew from Local Assembly 6, of the American Flint, owing to President Smith's refusal to form a new union on the south side.

The American Flintglass Workers' Union has a membership of 5,000 in the United States and Canada, and embraces all the workmen, with but few exceptions. It will be impossible to operate the works of Macbeth & Co. without members of the union.

About a month ago President Smith, of the American Flints, mailed circulars to every preceptory in the country, explaining the situation and asking a vote on the matter. Replies have been received to all the circulars sent out, and at a meeting of the union, at Silver Palace Hall, the result was announced.

—We clip the following account from the Johnstown Tribune. "About 8 o'clock on Saturday morning, George Hagely was crushed to death in the engine house of the Cambria iron company's blast furnaces Nos. 5 and 6. He was employed as an engine-wiper and was working at engine No. 2, when he made a misstep and fell between the fly-wheel and engine.
