News in Brief.

CLEVELAND O., March 21.—In the Cora Green kidnapping case at Greenville, the physicians yesterday made a full examination of the girl's body. They found it horribly bruised and cut, and succeeded in extracting the mashed and flattened ball from under the outline on the forehead.

OMAHA, March 21.—Edward Johnson shot and killed H. C. Steadman, a Buffalo county, yesterday, without provocation. He secured a Winchester rifle and a quantity of ammunition and mounting a horse, fled, pursued by a small party who soon overtook him. A regular battle ensued, during which he killed two men.

LEBANON, Pa., March 18.—A Hunan affected with small pox was begun from door to door in the suburbs of the city. Word was sent to the Board of Health and a requisition was obtained for his removal to the almshouse, but he disappeared. It is supposed that he has gone out among the poor, and there is considerable alarm as to the dissemination among the people.

CINCINNATI, O., March 18.—A short ago Esquire Borhman, of Alverton a suburb of Cincinnati, lost a suit worth \$500. This preyed upon the mind of his wife, that it is supposed she was deranged. This morning Mr. Borhman heard a noise in his wife's bed in which his two sons also slept, attempting to enter, but found the door locked. Everything becoming quiet he did not at once force an entry, but when he did get into the room he found his wife dead, with her feet with a razor; his son Albert also dead, with his throat cut by his mother; and another son, Arthur, severely and fatally wounded by a blow on the head with a hammer.

It is thought that this can be done in a few days. An arrangement on the principle of an old-fashioned candle-snuffer is now being made. Arms will extend on each side of sufficient length to allow the men to work with safety.
