When she learned of her arrest she left for Florida, but was decoyed back by detectives. LEBANON, Pa., March 27 .- Last Tuesday Anthony Heelble, aged 22 years, in a quarrel with his brother George, aged 18 years, beat and kicked him so he became unconscious, and was found in that condition by their father. The police authorities promptly arrested and jailed-him, but George's condition improved so much that his father entered bail for his appearance

On Wednesday night fire was discovered in his father's barn, a large Swiss structure filled with valuable farming implements and ten head of cattle. The live stock was saved but everything else was consumed. Suspicions pointed to Anthony Hoelble, who was arrested, and this afternoon he made a confession before Chief-of Police Leedom. He acknowledged that he had set fire to his father's barn through revenge, and also that he had set fire to four other barns in this county within the past four months. The confession causes great excitement in the Lebanou valley.

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
