## Suing for Heavy Damages.

NEW YORK, March 25.—More than five years ago William Keating was confined in the Ward's Island Lunatic Asylum on the testimony of Drs. Hardy and Jackson, who declared that he was insane, and a few days after he was discharged. On October 16, 1882, the Tribune printed an article headed "Turning Lunatics Loose," in which an interview with the superintendent of the Ward's Island Asylum was given, and in which he said that one of Mr. Keating's delusions was concerning the issuance of banknotes and bonds, which he manufactured himself and took to the office at the asylum, and that Keating had endeavored to pay the lawyer who secured his release in manufactured banknotes, or he would not pay him at all.

Keating declared that this article reflected upon his character and branded him as a criminal. He has brought suit against the Tribune Association in the Supreme Court, and asks for \$100,000 damages. The Tribune, he says refused to publish a denial of the libel. The plaintiff was examined to-day, and told the story of his arrest and subsequent incarceration in the asylum. He declares that he was never insane, but that his troubles were brought about by malicious prosecution on the part of his father, who resorted to tricks to have him arrested and adjudged insane. He said that he is also suing Drs. Hardy and Jackson and Drs. McGoold and Egan to recover \$100,000 damages the former for having placed him in the asylum and the latter for keeping him there when they knew he was not insane.

## A Female Snarper.

NASHVILLE, March 19.—A telegram from Spring City gives details of the arrest of Miss Daisy Carroll, one of the best known ladies of Rhea county. She was arrested for complicity in the embezzlement of about \$100,000 from the Champion works of Springfield, Ohio, by a confidential book-keeper Frank Jones. It seems that the two have been working in concert. The woman came from Ohio two years ago bought a fine farm near Spring City and spent money lavishly. She was the leader in society and was very popular and greatly admired. Jones frequently visited her, passing as her half-brother. When she learned of her arrest she left for Florida, but was decoyed back by detectives. Books of the Champion company were found secreted in her ice house at Spring City and other evidence of her complicity in Jones' crime has been discovered. She will be taken to Ohio.

## A Confessed Incendiary.

LEBANON, Pa., March 27.—Last Tuesday Anthony Hoelble, aged 22 years, in a quarrel with his brother George, aged 18 years, beat and kicked him so he became unconscious, and was found in that condition by his father. The police authorities promptly arrested and jailed him, but George's condition improved so much that his father entered bail for his appearance at court.

On Wednesday night fire was discovered in his father's barn, a large Swiss structure filled with valuable farming implements and ten head of cattle. The live stock was saved but everything else was consumed. Suspicious pointed to Anthony Hoelble, who was arrested, and this afternoon he made a confession before Chief of Police Leedom. He acknowledged that he had set fire to his father's barn through revenge, and also that he had set fire to four other barns in this county within the past four months. The confession causes great excitement in the Lebanon valley.

## The Buzzards Again.

LANCASTER, Pa., March 24.—It seems likely that the Welsh Mountains will again be the scene of some old time depredations by one of the famous Buzzard brothers. For some years Mart Buzzard, one of the brothers of Abe and Ike Buzzard, the notorious outlaws, now in the Eastern Penitentiary, assumed the role of a reformed thief, because a detective had aided the officers in breaking up the gang of thieves who made the Welsh Mountains their headquarters. The farmers in that section of the county believed that Mart's reformation was thorough, and he was aided by them in a substantial way. Mart last fall fell from grace. He was suspected of being a party to some of the numerous thefts committed in the vicinity of the mountains, but nothing definite could be laid in his charge until about ten days ago, when he stole a hog. A warrant was placed in the hands of Constable Lowery, of Earl township, to execute and he went in search of the Buzzard. Mart heard that the constable was after him and kept out of his way. Mart is also strongly suspected of having stolen a horse. A complaint for forgery will also be preferred against Mart. It appears that he presented an order to Rev. Price Z. Supple, of Honeybrook, for some of the money raised for the benefit of the residents of the Welsh Mountains who were in needy circumstances. The order was signed Mrs. Abe Buzzard. A large sum of money was given to him, and it was afterward learned that the woman's name had been forged.
