Waite, the Informer.

NEW YORK, May 12.—It is definitely known now that the defense in the Jaehne trial, will seek to break down the testimony of ex-Alderman Chas. B. Waite and thus secure the discharge of the prisoner. The attorneys for the indicted Alderman have secured a complete record of the life of ex-Alderman Waite, one of the bribed members of the 1884 board and the only "squealer" among the twenty-two men who are charged with having received bribes from Jake Sharpe's bootleg-men. Waite's record has been frequently touched upon in the papers here and the story to be told in court by the defense in the effort to discredit Waite as a witness for the prosecution will prove one of the most remarkable and startling ever made public in any city.

Date of the President's Wedding.

WASHINGTON, May 14.—A private letter received to-day from W. S. Bissell, states that the President's wedding, according to the present programme, will occur in Buffalo, June 12. The latest advices from Europe are to the effect that Mrs. Folsom is suffering from a relapse of the Roman fever, but that, if she is able to travel, there will be no delay in the date of the wedding. On the other hand, if the wedding should be postponed on account of Mrs. Folsom's illness, it will occur within a week after her return to America.

A Tale of the Sea.

QUEBEC, May 12.—Last October the steamer Brooklyn was wrecked on Anticosti Island. The wrecking steamer Earl of Dufferin went to the wreck, and after securing a quantity of the cargo from the Brooklyn was herself wrecked in the same place on November. The owners of the vessel understood that the crew wanted to remain on the island all winter and did not try to get them off. The crew consisting of twelve men, not getting assistance, built a hut of wreckage seven miles from Fox Harbor, where there are only three fishermen's families. They got what provisions they could from the wreck and settled down.

During the winter they suffered terribly from the cold, and towards spring their provisions ran short, when one of their number, James Grier, decided to try to get home. He took an open boat and crossed the Gulf of St. Lawrence, a distance of 180 miles, to Gospel Point. He was three days in making the passage, and suffered severely. It was the middle of April when he left, and the men had nothing to eat except flour, and had no prospect of getting anything. The suffering men will be sent for immediately.

Another Gusher.

WASHINGTON, Pa., May 12.—This afternoon the Vandergrift No. 1, on the William Barre property, got down rightly in the sand from which the old Dyer gusher has been doing business all along, and began to spout out crude at a rattling rate. The well lies eight hundred feet east of the south of the old Dyer. For the past few days it has not been putting out much oil, but the deeper drilling this afternoon drew it out of the rut and placed it in the van of to-morrow's bear factors. A gauge for four hours ending at 8 p. m. shows an average hourly production of fifty-six barrels. At this rate the gusher is doing 1,345 barrels a day.

The Vandergrift No. 2, on the same farm, was also drilled deeper this afternoon, and ran the production up to twenty-five barrels per hour or 600 barrels per day.

The Willets No. 3 has greatly improved with to-day's pumping on the rock. The rate of production to-night is thirteen barrels an hour. The new oil got to-day will swell the total daily production of the field up to 6,200 barrels.
