Knights of Labor.

CLEVELAND, O., May 29.—The four hours session of the General Assembly of the Knights of Labor this morning was devoted to the discussion of the motion made yesterday to refer the report of the Executive Board on the relation of the Order to trades-unions to the Committee on the State of the Order. Speeches were made by a number of leading members, and from their tenor it is certain that the trades-unions will not get all they ask. It seems more than probable that the affair will remain unsettled.

After a short discussion this afternoon the whole matter was referred to the committee.

The committee on Laws, having recommended that, where practicable, unattached local assemblies should become part of district assemblies and transact business with the General Assembly through them, the proposition was adopted.

The secretary read a letter from Galveston, Texas, relating to the hardships of strikers who are confined in the jail of that city for "constructive contempt," and asking the General Assembly to do something to obtain for them privileges given persons similarly charged in other courts of the United States. The following was presented and unanimously adopted:

Whereas the jails at Galveston, Dallas and elsewhere in Texas are filled with brother Knights suffering for "contempt

of Court" as issued by Judge Pardee; be it

Resolved, by this General Assembly, that we petition Grover Cleveland, President of the United States, to exercise clemency in their behalf, as the United States Judges have rendered a release of all prisoners sentenced during the strikes on the Southwest system, and thus be the means of causing better feelings between employers and employees.

The Committee on legislation presented the following proposition in the nature of demands of congress, which were ratified by the convention.

First—That patents for the public lands be given to actual settlers only.

Second—That all land owned by any individual or corporation in excess of 160 acres, whether improved or unimproved, shall be taxed to the full value of improved lands.

Third—Calling for the immediate forfeiture of all lands where the conditions have been complied with be issued forth with, so that taxation may take effect at once.

Fifth—Calling for the removal of fences from the public domain.

Sixth—That after 1890 the government shall by purchase and right of eminent domain obtain possession of all lands now held by aliens.

Seventh—That after 1886 aliens shall be prohibited from acquiring titles to lands.

Eighth—Asking the abolition of all laws requiring a property qualification for voters.

Ninth—Requesting the passage of a law levying a graduated income tax.

Tenth—Protesting against the cutting down of the appropriation for the labor bureau.

Eleventh—Asking for the passage of the bills approved by the congressional labor committee.

Twelfth—Asking for the passage of a law prohibiting the employment in mines, shops, factories, etc., of minors for more than eight hours per day.

In this connection the following resolution was adopted.

During the afternoon session legislative committees reported a demand that minors be prohibited from working eight hours per day in mines and manufactories. The following in the same report was also adopted.

Resolved, That we hold responsible at the ballot box all members of congress who neglect or refuse to vote in compliance with these demands.

The rest of the afternoon was devoted to a discussion of the report of the committee on strikes and boycotts recommending that the executive board should have absolute control of all such business.

A Monster well.

PITTSBURG, May 29.—The oil market was seriously affected this week by the Belmont oil company's work well No. 1 coming in as a gusher. This well is located about three miles west of the borough of Washington, near the Smith Dyer well, which has been doing so well for several months. During the past two weeks the Cameron has shown for a small well, its production up to Saturday having been about sixty barrels or less daily. On Saturday afternoon it got a paystreak and increased to 200 barrels a day. On Sunday this was increased to 200 barrels an hour. Oil men of experience regard the Washington fields as more threatening than ever, as much as a pay streak has been developed deeper down than the deep wells have yet been drilled. Just now there are several important wells about due in the Washington and Kane fields and all of them seem to be quite promising.

A bright three-year-old baby, unaccompanied by either of its parents, and ticketed from New York to St. Louis, passed through the Union station Pittsburgh, on Saturday. The baby and its mother were passengers in the steamship City of Rome, and were on their way to join the father and husband in St. Louis. The mother died during the voyage and was buried in mid-ocean, and the little one was taken the rest of its long journey in the care of strangers. It had become quite a pet with the portiers who had it in charge.—Ebensburg Freeman.
