SANDY HOOK, N. J., September 7.—The only indication of the rising of the sun this morning was a dull glare in the eastern sky.

The start was made at 10:56:20 with the Mayflower about one length ahead. The Mayflower broke out her jib topsail as she crossed the line and drew rapidly away from the Englishman.

Both made a splendid picture as they rounded the lightship to this point. The Mayflower had now beaten the Galatea nine minutes and twelve seconds, and she was fully two miles away when the latter squared way.

NEW YORK, September 6.—Emma Hubbard, 16 years of age, started to lead her father's horse to a brook on the farm, a short distance west of Amityville, L. I., yesterday.

It was plain that the horse became enraged and fastened her teeth upon her throat, choking her until she was dead.

At ten o'clock last night Burgess Abbott and Councilman Burke, of Pittston borough, made a discovery, at the lock-up in that town, that greatly horrified them and caused no end of excitement for some time afterwards.

Civil War May Come

SOFIA, September 6.—Before Prince Alexander announced his intention to quit the throne he received a telegram from Prince Bismark, recommending that he should abdicate in order to save Bulgaria.

Prince Alexander on Saturday presided at a meeting representing all parties in Bulgaria. It was decided to appoint M. Stambuloff, M. Radoslavoff, M. Karaveloff, M. Guechhoff and M. Stoiloff to negotiate with Russia and other powers for the settlement of the Bulgarian crisis.

The Belle Plain Well.

BELLE PLAIN, Ia., Sept. 5.—The great well still flows. For a short time last evening it was partially shut off, the great cone, having been enlarged to 36 inches, was lowered full of sand. It went easily for 60 feet, when it became necessary to drive it, and the 100 pound hammer was applied to the 5-inch pipe connected with the cone.

An Inhuman Father.

GADSDEN, Ala., September 7.—Cabe Watis lived ten miles in the country in a cabin with his three children, the eldest 10 years of age. Recently he expressed a wish to get rid of them and a few nights since knocked all of them in the head with a stick, piled quilts and bedding on the floor, set fire to the house, fastened the door and left.

Defeated by Bandits

NEW LAREDO, Mex September 6.—The greatest excitement has prevailed here since the arrival last night of the wounded soldiers who had taken part in the fight between government troops and the revolutionists under command of the notorious "El Coyote."

BOMBAY, September 6.—Lord Dufferin the British viceroy, has abrogated the treaty with the rajah of Sikkim, because the rajah permitted Tibetan troops to enter his territory.

ATHENS, September 6.—Renewed earthquake shocks have been felt at Pyrgos, in Morea.

HARRISBURG, Pa., September 3.—The Grangers' picnic, the largest affair of the kind ever held in this section, came to an end this evening. The crowd to-day numbered several thousand, but was not nearly so large as yesterday.
