PITTSBURGH, September 23. - Mrs. Ella Though and Margaret A. White, sisters, and Edward White, husband of the latter, were arrested at their home at Fayette City, charged with forming a conspiracy to place their brother, William H. Todd, in an insane asylum in order to deprive himof his patrimony in an estate valued at two and a half million dollars. Todd is a river pilot, is about 40 years of age and has spent most of his life following his occupation in the lower rivers He alleges that because he married against their will the defendants had him confined in Dixmont asylum for six months on a false charge of insanity. The officers in the station, tak ing an interest in his case, had him examined by the board of managers, who declared him sane and ordered his release. Defendants were held for a preliminary hearing on Monday.

LINA, O., September 23 .- This city was startled this morning by a terriffic elap of thunder, and in a moment black clouds of smoke were seen rolling up from one of the wells in the Brotherton land. The fire at once communicated with the tank, and in a few moments all was on fire, and at the same time gas in the tank three hundred yards west of the wells, all the machinery and land and Mrs. Folsom. tank, and about 24,000 barrels of oil were consumed. Death of Bisnop Shannahan.

HARRISBURG, Pa., September 24 .-Bishop Shanuahan, head of the diocese of Harrisburg, embracing seventeen counties, died suddenly at his residence on Sylvan heights, East Harrisburg, Schilling. Yesterday a postal card at 11:30 o'clock this morning. Although in failing health for years, his death was entirely unexpected. He was out riding yesterday and returned in good spirits. Early this morning he was taken with a congestive chill, which terminated fatally a few days old, born in her father's man-

Bishop Shannahan was born in Susquehanna county, Pennsylvania and made his classical course at St. Joseph's college and his theological course at the St. Charles Philadelphia He was ordained July 12, 1857; made Philadelphia, and held it for ten years when he was consecrated Bishop of Harrisburg, to-gether with Bishop O'Hara, of Scranton, and installed in the cathedral lin this city September 4, 1868. He leaves one brother and one sister, the former being a pastor of one of the largest churches in Philadelphia.
