The man who committed the outrage came on a late train from Milton with Arbuckle and had invited the latter to spend the night with him. After being beaten in a shocking manner, Arbuckle was dragged some distance and hidden in a pile of kindling wood. He recoverconsciousness this morning and i now in the hospital with some hopes of recovery. He was able to give a description of his assailant and officers are in search of him.

Keep to the Right.

There is nothing in the law that requires a person walking or driving on the highway to keep to the right, but when a pedestrian or rider on horse back or in a vehicle is passing along a sidewalk or road going and keeping to the right he is always in a position to compel anyone coming from an opposite direction to turn out. If people on a crowded highway or sidewalk would do this all confusion would be avoided and locomotion carried on without colision. In walking the sidewalk nothing is so annoying as to meet a person walking toward you on his left side of the road while you ere travelling in his direction on your right side. There is certain kind of rudeness in this which shows people lack good breeding who indulge in it for no lady or gentlemen who is accustomed to the amenities or courtesies of the sidewalk, will persist in keeping to the left. And the same rule holds good in driving on the high way. A careful handler of horses, and a gentleman who knows how to hold the reins always keeps to the right. He prides himself in doing this, while they who do otherwise are obstructions of the highway. Keep to the right, then. Do it while walking on the sidewalk or driving on the highway, and you will always avoid trouble .- Clinton Democrat.

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
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
