Powder Mills Blow up.

BARTOW, N. Y., Sept. 30 .- A terrific explosion occurred at Ditmar powder works at Bay Chester, on the Harlem river branch of the New York and New Haven road, about 10 o'clock taneous death of four men employed in the factory. The explosion occur. ed in the packing house, a one story ander. frame building 20 by 30 feet, in the centre of the grounds, and about two hundred yards from the main factory, a large building near the water, where the bulk of the giant powder and nitroglycerine used in the new aqueduct works is manufactured. The men were hard at work, jutting up and packing cartridges when suddenly the explosion occurred, shattering the building to splinters and blowing four men to fragments. 
