

Saturday evening was observed as the eve of All-Saints' Day. This is Catholia festival celebrated on the lst of November, but as the eve of all Hallowmas rightfully comes on Sunday this year, Saturday evening was observ ed as a consequence in its stead. This feast was established by Boniface IV., in 611, for the commemoration of all the martyrs, and extended to the festival of All-Saints by Gregory IV., in 830. In Scotland Halloween is the time designating the eve of Hallowmas and few are the boys who do not observe this time, though many are unacquainted with its origin and history. To most o them this fact matters little, and as i the case with some other holidays, they study more how to have a good time than the history of the day they celebrate. 
