

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 6.—Tomorrow one of Randall's lieutenants (probably Cabell, of Virginia) will be recognized to move the passage, under a suspension of the rules, of a bill repealing all tobacco taxes. This motion will receive about 170 votes. It will have about 140 votes against it, and 100 of the negative votes will come from the Democratic side of the House and 40 from the Republican side. The motion, therefore, will fail. This will end all prospect of revenue reduction at this session. The motion will be made in pursuance of a final agreement between Randall and Carlisle, which will be communicated tomorrow morning. Randall yesterday wrote a letter to Carlisle (which Henderson, of North Carolina, and Cable, of Virginia, also signed) stating that he could not agree to either of the four propositions Carlisle had suggested in his letter, namely: First, if a reduction of the tax on distilled spirits was deemed indispensable, to make the tax on all distilled spirits the same; second, if a reduction in the tobacco tax was deemed indispensable, to make a like reduction in tariff taxes; third, to submit the whole matter to a party caucus and abide its decision; fourth, to unite in a motion to go into committee of the whole to consider the Randall bill of last session. Instead of this Randall proposed waiving tariff tax reduction entirely, and that the speaker should recognize one of the Randallites tomorrow to move the passage under a suspension of the rules, of a bill repealing all tobacco taxes. To this Carlisle replied that he would consider the matter and reply to-morrow morning. There is every reason to believe that he will accede to the request.

After the interview between Randall and Carlisle on the 30th of January, at which Randall made inquiries as to the chances of his Apple-Jack bill, the following correspondence ensued:

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 31.—Hon. Samuel J. Randall, Hon. George Cabell and others—Gentlemen: In accordance with the understanding between us yesterday afternoon I have to-day consulted with the Democratic members of the committee of Ways and Means in the House of Representatives for the purpose of ascertaining whether or not some measure for the reduction of taxation can be agreed upon which will receive the support of all our political friends in the House, and I am directed to request you to submit at your earliest convenience for our consideration some definite proposition.

There is now pending upon the calendar of the House a bill (No 9702) introduced during the last session by Mr. Randall which proposes legislation upon the subject of the tariff and the internal revenue, and within the last few days we have been furnished with a copy of a bill which appears to be intended as a substitute for the one now pending, which also relates to both the subjects mentioned above. Whether you desire to make one or both of these bills or some other measure the basis of our action we are not advised, and, being anxious to make every effort in our power to secure harmony and concert of action upon these important subjects, we respectfully submit the foregoing. WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 1.—Hon. John G. The bill you refer to as a modification of our substitute for House bill 9702 of last session, embracing both tariff and internal revenue tax reductions, is the measure which the friends with whom we are acting submit for consideration. These gentlemen are prepared to consider in a friendly spirit and with a view of uniting the party on a revenue reduction measure any modification of the proposed bill which the friends of other measures may have to present. I enclose copy of bill referred to.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 4.—Hon. Samuel J. Randall, Hon. George C. Cabell and others—Gentlemen: Your favor submitting for our consideration the bill recently prepared as a modification of, or substitute for House bill No. 9702, introduced by Mr. Randall at the last session of Congress, was received by me late in the afternoon day before yesterday, and was at once submitted to the gentlemen mentioned in my first communication. We have considered the measure as carefully as its comprehensive character and the limited time at our

disposal would permit and herewith submit it, together with the modifications and changes which, in our opinion, are necessary in order to make it acceptable as a compromise measure to those who desire to secure a material reduction in tariff taxes.

You will observe that we propose to add several articles to the free-list and to strike out of the bill every provision which increases the rates of duty now imposed by law upon imported goods. These increases are numerous and in some cases very material, as will be seen by the memorandum hereto appended. In our opinion the existing financial condition of the Government and the people does not demand and would not even excuse an increase in the rates of taxation upon any article embraced in our tariff or internal revenue laws, and we cannot therefore agree to support any measure which has that effect.

We propose also to strike out of the bill all provisions abolishing the internal revenue tax on manufactured tobacco, snuff and cigars, wine, beer and fruit brandies, and reducing the tax on distilled spirits from 90 cents per gallon to 60 cents, and the provision abolishing the tax on alcohol for use in the arts and manufactures. In lieu of these repeals and reductions we propose to repeal all statutes and parts of statutes imposing restriction upon the sale of leaf tobacco by planters and farmers, and to amend the internal revenue laws as to dispense with the employment of gaugers and store keepers at distilleries which mash five bushels of grain or less per day and to permit such distilleries to pay tax only upon their surveyed capacity. We also propose to amend the internal revenue laws as to prevent the destruction of stills and other apparatus seized for alleged violations of the internal revenue laws and so as to prevent the issuing of any warrant for alleged violations of these laws, unless the affidavit thereon is first approved by the District Attorney and written instructions are given by him for the issuance of the warrant.

In lieu of the administrative part of the bill submitted to us we propose to substitute the bill introduced by Mr. Hewitt, as finally revised and corrected at the Treasury Department and heretofore agreed upon by the Committee of Ways and Means, but not yet reported. We find, upon examination, that the substitute which we recommend relates alone to the administrative features of the law, while that part of the measure submitted by you to us increases the rates of taxation while we submit the accompanying modifications of the bill referred to us in the sincere hope that it will meet the approval and secure the united support of our political friends, yet, in case it should not be agreed to by you and the gentlemen with whom you are acting, we respectfully submit the following alternative propositions:

First. If the reduction of internal revenue tax upon distilled spirits is to be made a condition upon which you and the gentlemen acting with you will consent to the reduction of tariff rates, then we shall insist that the rate of taxation shall be the same upon all kinds of distilled spirits.

Second. If the repeal of the internal tax upon manufactured tobacco, snuff and cigars in whole or in part is to be made a condition upon which you and the gentlemen with whom you are acting will be willing to agree to a reduction of tariff taxation, then we shall insist that in the same bill an equal amount of reduction shall be made in the revenue derived from customs, and that this reduction shall be made upon such articles as those with whom we are acting shall indicate.

Third. We are willing to submit the measure which you have referred to us to a caucus of our political friends for its consideration, all parties to be bound by such action as it may take upon the subjects to which this bill relates.

Fourth. In case none of the suggestions herein before made are accepted by you and the gentleman with whom you are acting, we are willing at any time, upon reasonable notice, to support a motion to go into committee of the whole on the State of the Union for the consideration of House bill No. 9702, introduced by Mr. Randall at the last session of Congress and now on the calendar.

Speaker Carlisle said to-night that he had not as yet sent a reply to Randall's last letter asking that the speaker recognize one of the Randallites to-morrow to move the passage, under suspension of the rules, of a bill repealing all the tobacco taxes. The speaker, acting on Mr. Morrison's advice, has determined not to comply with Randall's request, and will so inform that gentleman to-morrow. He will state that he sees no good reason why tobacco should be singled out from all the other taxed articles of consumption for immediate relief, and that he will not be a party to such a scheme.
