M. E. CONFERENCE.

The nineteenth annual session of the Central Pennsylvania conference of the Methodist Episcopal church, began at 9:30 Thursday morning in the Methodist Episcopal church.
Bishop Warren read parts of Luke x, and II. Corinthians x, as scripture lessons, and announced the usual conference hymn: "And are we yet alive, and see each other's face," after singing of which he offered a very fervent and touching prayer.
He greeted the brethren in the name of the Lord. He said we are not strangers at all, for everybody knows the Central Pennsylvania conference; all are glad to come to it. Every man is to be congratulated who has the privilege to look the conference in the face. He referred to the night of God as the only secret of success. He prophesied a pleasant and profitable session inasmuch that we should go forth as giants filled with new wine.
The transfer of Rev. J. W. Bedford to this conference was announced, and the secretary of the last conference called upon to call the conference roll.
On motion of Rev. George Leidy, Dr. D. S. Monroe was elected secretary. Dr. Monroe selected Dr. W. W. Evans as recording secretary, and Revs. W. S. Carver and T. S. Wilcox were elected as assistant secretaries. Rev. E. T. Swartz was chosen as statistician, who chose as his assistants Revs. P. P. Strawhinski, Edwin H. Witman, John H. Mortimer and Horace L. Jacobs.
Dr. Monroe offered the following resolutions which were adopted:
WHEREAS, The Rev. Henry W. Warren is with us in an official capacity for the first time.
Resolved, That we pledge him our hearty sympathy and co-operation in the arduous duties which devolve upon him.

change in the ratio of representatives in the general conference. The amendment proposed is as follows: "The annual conference shall not allow more than one ministerial representative for every forty-five members of an annual conference; nor allow a less number than one for every ninety, nor more than two lay delegates for any annual conference, provided, nevertheless, that when there shall be in any annual conference a fraction of two-thirds of the number which shall be fixed for the total of representation, such annual conference shall be entitled to an additional delegate for such fraction, and provided also, that no conference shall be denied the privilege of one ministerial and one lay delegate." This is a change of the reading of section 2 of paragraph 71 of the discipline which provides that the ratio shall be not more than one ministerial delegate for every fourteen members nor less than one for every forty-five.
After several addresses for and against the resolution by Revs. F. B. Riddle, John Donahue, M. K. Foster, Dr. Gray, Dr. Evans and Rev. Taylor, a vote was taken, the resolution being lost by a vote of 169 to 10.
Dr. Brush, of Dakota, was introduced and given the privilege of a two minutes talk, representing the work of the church in that territory.
The character of Rev. M. K. Foster was passed and he read his report, showing gratifying results. He referred feelingly to Dr. Crever, who has been bereft of his wife during the year, as also to Brother Baldwin, whose home has been twice invaded by death. Dr. Crever intends by a liberal use of money, to make the church at Petersburg a memorial church to his wife.
The character of the effective elders passed.
Rev. Mr. Stevens, of Williamsport district, read his report, which showed that much good work had been accomplished during the year.
The character of the elders passed.
A very exciting discussion took place with reference to the publication of the annual minutes and the amount of material to be put in. A motion not to publish the presiding elder's reports was laid on the table.
The bishop summed up the number of conversions of the five districts and announced the number as 6,994, or within six of being 7,000. The doxology was sung and conference adjourned with the benediction by Bishop Warren.
At 2:30 o'clock the Sunday school anniversary was held, presided over by Rev. J. A. Wood. The opening prayer was made by Rev. Mr. Haughtawatt, and excellent addresses were made by Revs. Geo. E. King and Dr. J. M. Freeman, of New York.
Miss Annie Colburn electrified the large congregation by a solo rendered in very fine style.
The anniversary at 7:30 was in the interest of the church extension society. President Rev. J. J. Pierce. Dr. W. W. Evans was introduced as the first speaker. He dwelt upon our opportunity as exhibited in our vast territory and the providential growth and development of our population; urged the seizing of the privilege by laying broad and deep the foundations of a high civilization by planting Christian churches with a full and pure gospel preached from their pulpits. Rev. A. J. Kynett, D. D., delivered one of his characteristic speeches.
SATURDAY.
Saturday's session was preceded by a very spirited service of prayer and song, conducted by Rev. Dr. Frost.
Promptly at 9 o'clock Bishop Warren took the chair and the business of the conference began. Dr. Kynett was given the privilege of saying a few words to the conference. He expressed the belief that in the prosecution of our work more printer's ink must be used, and less time occupied in addressing conference. He spoke of the purpose of the church extension society to organize an insurance department, by which our churches can be insured at a cheaper rate than that now charged by the different companies.
The records were read and approved.
Rev. A. A. Taylor was granted leave of absence, as was also Rev. J. S. Beyer.
Rev. S. C. Swallow offered a preamble and resolution relative to total prohibition which after much discussion was passed.
Rev. M. L. Drum, J. B. Young and B. H. Mosser were elected as a committee to examine the minutes of the Altoona district conference.
The fourteenth question was taken up and Revs. N. H. Schenck, J. H. Kerlin, G. M. Klepfer, J. K. Kniesly and S. E. Meminger were elected to elders orders.
The tenth question was taken up and Revs. J. B. Stein, V. T. Rue, George Nelson Crotley were elected to local deacons orders.
Rev. Steek, of the Lutheran church, was introduced.
Dr. Freeman addressed the conference briefly in the interest of the Sunday school union and tract society.
The fifth question was taken up, namely, "Who are admitted into full connection?" Bishop Warren read the word of God from the Book of Jonah, and announced hymn No. 818.
The class is composed of the following ministers: Revs. J. C. Mumper, E. G. Baker, L. M. Brady, A. W. Houts, T. A. Elliott, W. W. Carhart, H. L. Jacobs, J. W. Forrest, W. R. Picken and E. T. Owen.
The bishop offered a very fervent prayer, and addressed some earnest words to the candidates to be received.
The usual disciplinary questions were produced and the following were admitted

into full connection, those not already deacons being elected to deacons' orders: Revs. J. C. Mumper, E. G. Baker, L. M. Brady, T. A. Elliott, W. W. Carhart, H. L. Jacobs, J. W. Forrest, W. R. Picken.
Rev. E. T. Owen was, on motion of Rev. M. L. Gance, discontinued.
The thirteenth question was taken up and students in the third year's course were advanced to the fourth year, their characters being passed. Class as follows: Revs. Alex. Lamberson, S. C. Wilson Bruce Hughes, M. J. Runyon, A. R. Lambert, Darwin F. Stiles (the last named person was granted a supernumerary relation), J. F. Glass, R. S. Taylor.
On motion of Dr. Monroe, Mrs. Angie F. Newman was introduced to the conference and given the privilege to address the body. She exhibited the Mormon Bible, hymn book and catechism. Their abominable teachings were exposed and the Christian people of the east implored to send the true light to these thousands of people who are sitting in the darkness.
On motion of Rev. S. C. Swallow, a committee was appointed to take a collection for the purchase of a tent asked for by this earnest woman to help them in their work among the women in Utah. The bishop emphasized her statements in a ringing speech. The collection amounted to \$100.
Dr. C. W. Smith, of the Pittsburg Christian Advocate, and Dr. C. N. Sims, of Syracuse University, were introduced to the conference.
After the usual notices the conference adjourned with the benediction by Bishop Warren.
The Mutual Beneficial association had a meeting at 2 p. m. at which some business pertaining to that phase of work was transacted.
At 2:30 Mrs. Newman delivered a very earnest and melting address to a crowded house.
Mrs. Gearhart, the president of the society made an interesting statement showing the vigorous growth of this society that is but an infant in days.
At 7:30 Rev. Dr. Sims delivered his famous lecture on "Home Building" to an appreciative audience. Those who have heard Dr. Sims know that the audience was treated to a feast of fat things.
SUNDAY SERVICES.
The conference love feasts are indeed seasons of refreshing. The one held at 9 o'clock was an exception to the rule. In charge of Rev. M. L. Smyser a most gracious season was experienced.
At the close of the service, and prior to the preaching service, the bishop ordained the following persons as deacons according to the impressive ritual of the church, the ministers in the congregation repeating with the bishop the service for the occasion: Rev. J. B. Stein, V. T. Rue, G. N. Crotley, J. C. Mumper, E. G. Baker, L. M. Brady, H. L. Jacobs and J. W. Forrest.
After the impressive service the bishop preached a sermon of wonderful scope and power from Matt vi: 33, "But seek ye first the kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things shall be added unto you."
In the afternoon the sermon appropriate to the occasion for the ordination of elders was preached in the Presbyterian church, at the conclusion of which Revs. A. H. Schenck, J. K. Kniesly, G. M. Klepfer, J. P. Kerlin and Samuel E. Meminger were ordained as elders. The missionary anniversary was held in the Methodist Episcopal church at 7 p. m. Rev. J. B. Shaver presided with grace and dignity. The speakers were Rev. D. H. Shields, Hon. J. B. McFally and Bishop Henry W. Warren, D. D.
The pulpits of the several churches in Bellefonte were ably and acceptably filled by the members of the conference and visiting brethren.
