Every twenty-four hours there is an increase in the colored population of 500. He predicted the time when the colored vote would be counted, and said that if they were not given Christian leadership their vote would be against Protestant institutions.

Professor Buell was introduced to the conference and made a short address in the interest of the Boston University of theology. He set forth in a very interesting way the advantages to be had in our literary institutions. He desired the brethren to advise young men of talent to go to some institution and qualify them- wife. selves for their life work. This address bristled with most excellent points.

Dr. Thoburn, of India, made a brief address. He is in this country to look up missionary recruits. He desires to secure twenty-five men to go as missionaries to India. He wants men of intellectual training. They have some schools in Calcutta with 1,400 students in them, who speak English very fluently. Any man who would exert a good influence upon these men must have more than a superficial education. 
