

Condensed Telegrams.

Hon. E. G. Ayer, founder of the town of Harvard, Ill., died there on Wednesday night, aged 75 years.

It is said that Billy Molony, now in Canada, has confessed and will testify against the "Boodler" Aldermen at the next trial in New York.

Edward N. Cody, for five years night Distributing Clerk of the Toledo (O.) post office, was arrested for robbing the mails, having been caught by means of decoy letters.

George Warner, teacher in a school at Williamsburg, Wis., punished a refractory pupil, Henry Zugbusck, by applying a ruler sharply to the back wrists resulting in his death. Werner then fled.

H. C. Grisor, a farmer of Bossier parish, La., was shot from ambush on Wednesday while plowing in the field. His 10-year-old son was the only witness of the crime, the perpetrator of which made his escape.

Joseph Burch, a well-to-do farmer living six miles west of Lima, O., on Wednesday killed his sick wife with a hammer, and then went to the woods near by, twisted some bark into a noose and hanged himself. Burch was temperate but weak minded, and the pair had had frequent quarrels.

Miss Catharine Fozze, during a quarrel with her nephew in Lancaster, dropped dead from heart disease, induced by excitement.

Raymond Shay, of Lebanon, aged 14 years, accidentally set fire to the clothing of his little brother on Thursday, and he was burned to death.

It is estimated that in a land slide on the Lehigh Valley Railroad, near Drake's Creek, on Tuesday night, 2000 tons of earth and rock fell.

Andrew Carnegie, of Pittsburgh, sailed for Scotland last Saturday. He would neither affirm nor deny a rumor that he is to marry Miss Estelle Whitfield, a belle of New York, whom he met at Crescon Springs last summer.

Centres Hall.—The following Centre Hall and vicinity items are culled from the Reporter:

An infant son of Rev. Land, of this place, which was suffering from whooping cough, was found dead in its cradle on Friday morning. The parents had sat up during the night nursing the little one, and as it became quiet and fell asleep, they likewise sought relief in sleep. On awaking in the morning the morning the child was found dead. Supposed that death was caused by the rupture of a blood-vessel.

She is a very aged lady being 88 years old, and the accident may prove serious on account of her great age. Dr. Jacobs was called and is doing the utmost for the unfortunate lady.

Miss Sadie, a daughter of John Bitter, of near this place, on Saturday sustained a severe sprain of an arm, by falling from a spring wagon. Her dress having caught as she was about to alight from the vehicle, she was thrown violently to the ground.

Mrs. Sarah C. Neff, of this place, died on Thursday evening, 7, after a continued illness of nearly one year, during which period she was confined to the sick room. The deceased was a daughter of John Motz, of Woodward, who died many years ago, and a sister of J. C. Motz of the same place. His death occurred about 5 p.m., April 7, 1880, while her death took place about 10 p.m., April 7, 1887. Her age was 56 years, 1 month and 16 days.
