Three horses were standing in the quarry at the time of the explosion. Of these two were killed outright and the other was so badly injured that it was ed men in the trade, and shot. The carts in the quarry were smashed into hundreds of pieces.

The stone quarries of the Cambria Iron Company are situated within 500 yards of the Pennsylvania Railroad station. Saturdsy forenoon the workmen arranged to explode a blast, using three kegs of ordinary blasting powder and two dynamite cartridges. This charge was in an elevated portion of the quarry, while the majority of the men, some twenty-five in number, were working in the flat below. At a given signal, all the men and horses slight report was heard, and it was found that the rock had not been disturbed by its force. Thinking that the powder had escaped through a "cave" and that none remained in proximity to the fuse, Foreman Stewart and Emanuel Sodders procured a steel bit and went to work boring out, refilling and tamping the hole to get ready for another blast. Suddenly and without warning, a thunderous boom was heard and was immediately followed by the fall of a great mass of rock. Death and consternation were the results. Headless and dismembered bodies, horribly mangled and dying, and the shockingly wounded lay scattered about on top and beneath the rocks in the quarry. Stewart and Sodders were hurled one hundred feet into the air, and their bodies were dashed with awful force upon the rocks below. Not less than fifty carloads of stone were hurled upon the men who were at work, and it is a miracle that any of them escaped alive. Two large rocks, weighing at least twenty tons each, were hurled upon four of the men, crushing them completely. 


