Relative to the settlement of certain military claims to Pennsylvania soldiers. To repeal an act to authorize boroughs to contract for the payment of all taxes upon lands.

HARRISBURG, June 3.—Among more important bills approved by Governor Beaver and handed down to-night were the following: Appropriating \$5,200 to reimburse R. H. Thomas, commissioner to the world's exhibition at New Orleans.

Appropriation for the state board of health; for the committee on lunacy; for the expenses of the anthracite mine and commission; for the maintenance of soldiers orphan's; for the expenses of the state board of agriculture; for the western penitentiary.

Also bills to protect the rights of share-holders on property etc., being the Erie Escheat bill; relating to the western penitentiary; authorizing the condemnation of turn-pike roads and highways, etc., extending the provisions of the thirty-fourth section of the corporation act of 1874 to fell companies and giving them right to eminent domain.

HARRISBURG, June 6.—Governor Beaver signed a number of bills to-night, among them one making an appropriation to the Whikesbarre city hospital, except items for deficiencies for 1885 and 1886 and for improvement to the grounds and furnishing.

The Veto Ax Falls. HARRISBURG, June 1.—Governor Beaver to-day vetoed house bill No. 6, entitled 'A further supplement to an act regulating boroughs approved April 3, 1861, authorizing the erection of wharves and the collection of wharfage thereon.'

Forty thousand dollars to the State Agricultural society, \$5,000 to the Granger's exhibition at William's Grove and \$10,000 to the American exhibition at London, all of which the Governor says are forbidden in section 18, article 3, of the constitution.

HARRISBURG, June 3.—Vetoed of the following bills were filed by Governor Beaver late to-night: To provide for the payment of the balance of the unpaid salaries of Henry W. Williams, late justice of the supreme court, and James R. Knox, late judge of the court of common pleas of the Eighteenth district.

The injured are: Noel Vorneo, severe scalp wound; Thomas Hiosa, slight fracture of the skull; George Hiosa, side and back badly injured; Noel Barnes, slight scalp wound, and a Hungarian, name unobtainable, who was brought to this city on Fast Line west Saturday evening, and taken to the Altoona Hospital in the ambulance.

All of the men who were killed, except Stewart, the foreman, were in indigent circumstances, and would have left their families with nothing to depend upon, but for the fact that they were members of the Cambria Iron Company Relief Association, from which each family will receive \$500.

The stone quarries of the Cambria Iron Company are situated within 500 yards of the Pennsylvania Railroad station. Saturday forenoon the workmen arranged to explode a blast, using three kegs of ordinary blasting powder and two dynamite cartridges. This charge was in an elevated portion of the quarry, while the majority of the men, some twenty-five in number, were working in the flat below.

At a given signal, all the men and horses having been removed to a safe distance, N. M. Holmes fired the charge. But a slight report was heard, and it was found that the rock had not been disturbed by its force. Thinking that the powder had escaped through a "cave" and that none remained in proximity to the fuse, Foreman Stewart and Emanuel Soddors procured a steel bit and went to work boring out, refilling and tamping the hole to get ready for another blast.

The startled inhabitants of the town poured from their houses and hastened to the quarry. The scenes that followed were heartrending in the extreme. The mangled forms of the dead and dying were gathered together and the former carried to a shanty near by.—Altoona Times.

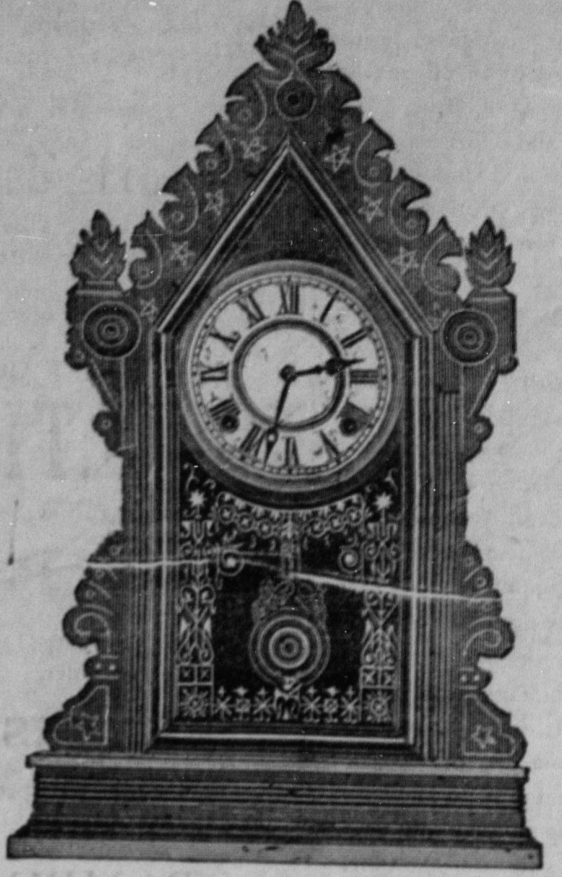
