A MENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION PROposed to the citizens of this Commonwealth for
their approval or rejection by the General Assembly
of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvanis. Published by
order of the Secretary of the Commonwealth, in pursuance of Article XVIII of the Constitution.

Joh t resolution proposing an amendment to the
constitution of the commonwealth:
SECTION i. Be it resolved by the Senate and House
of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, That the following is
proposed as an amendment of the constitution of the
commonwealth of Pennsylvania in accordance with
the provisions of the eighteenth article thereof.

"If twenty-two years of age or upwards, he shall

Every male citizen twenty-one years of age, possessing the following qualifications, shall be entitled to vote at the polling place of the election district of which he shall at the time be a resident and not elsewhere.

where: First, He shall have been a citizen of the United States at least thirty days. Second. He shall have resided in the state one year

States at least thirty days.

Second. He shall have resided in the state one year (or if, having previously been a qualified elector or native born citizen of the state, he shall have removed therefrom and returned them six months) immediately preceding the election.

Third, He shall have resided in the election district where he shall offer to vote at least thirty days immediately preceding the election. The legislature at the session thereof next after the adoption of this section, shall, and from time to time thereafter may, enact laws to properly enforce this provision.

Fourth, Every male citizen of the age of twentyone years, who shall have been a citizen for thirty days and an inhabitant of this state one year next preceding an election, except at municipal elections, and for the last thirty days a resident of the election district in which he may offer his vote, shall be entitled to a vote at such election in the election district of which he shall at the time be a resident and not eleswhere for all officers that now are or hereafter may be elected by the people: Providen, That in time of war no elector in the actual military service of the State or of the United States, in the army or navy thereof, shall be deprived of his vote, by reason of his absence from such election district and the legislature shall have power to provide the manner in which and the time and place at which such absent electors may vote, and for the return and canvas of their votes in the election district in which they respectively raide.

Fifth. Por the purpose of voting, no person shall be deemed to haye gained or lost a residence by reason of his presence or absence while employed in the service of the United States or the State, nor while engaged in the navigation of the waters of the State or of the high seas nor while a student of any college

vice of the United States or the State, nor while engaged in the navigation of the waters of the State or of the high seas nor while a student of any college or seminary of learning, nor while kept at any almehouse or public institution, except the immates o. any home for disabled and indigent soldiers and sailors who, for the purpose of voting, shall be deemed to reside in the election district where said home is located. Laws shall be made for ascertaining by proper proofs, the citizens who shall be entitled to the right of suffrage hereby established.
