

Secrion 1. Be it resolved by the Senate and House
of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsyl-

of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, That the following is proposed as an amendment of the constitution of the commonwealth of Pennsylvania in accordance with the provisions of the eighteenth article thereof.
