The result of the elections Tuesday are very satisfactory in their results to the people of the borough who have their interests at stake, particularly in this so with the Chief Burgess, Tax Collector and Overseer of the Poor. The contest on Burgess was a rebuke to the little crowd who combined and dictated to the Republicans of the borough who should be their candidate for that office. Feidler whose posterior has hardly got warmed in the town forced Walter Bayard on the Republicans because he was a Knight of Labor and against the wishes and better judgment of the Republican party and the result is that Bayard will not part his hair in the Burgess office. The election of Keichline and Schofield is an endorsement of their administration of their offices that they should feel very proud of and one that is deserved. In the West ward it seems that Joseph Gross is a resident by about 17 majority, and the old mare can not be put in at \$150 this time. When our friend John Olewine challenged Mr. Gross' vote he put his foot in it up to his knees. The Gazette man's little boom for the Legislature has been nipped by the early frost. But we hope he may carefully nurse it into life again and be able to dictate his nomination to the Republican party next fall. We are sorry for Mr. Feidler but the verdict of his party is that he is "too fresh."
