

**Gould and Sage Escape.**

New York, February 29.—The Grand Jury handed a communication to Judge Cowing to-day before they were discharged, in which they say that a proceeding was brought before them by the District Attorney in regard to Messrs. J. Gould and Russell Sage, as trustees of the Kansas Pacific Railroad mortgage in 1880; that they have given the case several days careful consideration, and have thoroughly examined all the competent witnesses offered; that they had the benefit of the assistance and advice of the District Attorney and the advice and rulings of the Court, and that under such rulings they did not feel warranted in finding an indictment. Mr. E. L. Andrews, one of the counsel for the complainants, said:

We do not propose to let the case rest where it is and will bring it before the next Grand Jury. It is evident that the Grand Jury have found that a crime was committed, but, under the ruling of Judge Cowing, decided not to bring an indictment simply because they thought under that ruling the crime had been barred from prosecution by the Senate of Limitations. We do not think so, and we believe that a trustee who secretes or withholds the trust property is guilty of larceny and that this secreting or withholding begins when the knowledge of the crime is attained. At any rate, we shall bring the case to the attention of the next Grand Jury, and labor to recover an indictment, so that some definite decision on the true construction of the code relative to the Statute of Limitation can be attained.

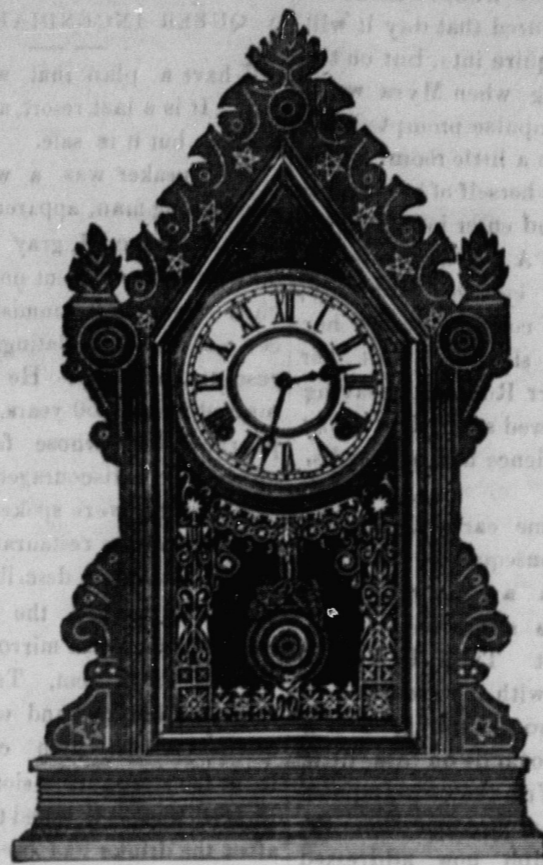
