A Fatal Earthquake.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 11 .- The Hong Kong Mail, copies of which were received here by last night's China steamer, gives a description of the earthquake in the province of Yunnan, December 15, and is indicative of frightful mortality. The Mail says: "In the interior department of Ching Chau the disturbances were exor from our midst, fills me.
