After the jail was closed for the night he ate a lunch composed of two boiled eggs, some cookies, a fried cake, part of a biscuit and tea. He retired at 3 o'clock, asking to be called at 6. After a hearty breakfast at 8.20 he saw General Thayer's law partner, Mr. Johnson, and had a long conference with him.

Eva Roy unexpectedly arrived from Albany this morning and at 6 o'clock called at the jail, but was refused admittance. The reading of the death warrant was omitted, and a few min' utes after 10 o'clock Van Brunt walked firmly to the seffold, the noose was placed around his neck and, when all was ready, the drop fell. The body was cut down in fourteen minutes-The crime for which "Happy Bob" Van Brunt was hanged was the murder of the half brother of his sweetheart, Eva Roy. "Happy Bob" was a prominent member of the Salvation Army, and for some time before the murder, which occurred on the evening of October 6, 1886, had been courting Eva Roy. Will Roy objected to his attentions to his half sister and had tried many times to persuade her to break with 'Happy Bob," but without effect.
