Found Apparently Dead in the Diamond. Centre county has her share of tragedies and accidents of late. Following close on the Cassidy murder, the Bagley shooting affray and other accidents, it is our duty to chronicle another frightful occurrence right in our own town, on the Diamond before the Court of Justice.
