A SPLENDID SOLDIER

Emperor William Honors Lance Cornoral Leuck.

PRESENTED WITH HIS PORTRAIT.

Attempts to Keep the Action of the Emperor a Secret-The Publication Produces a Sensation-Bitter Comments Over the Emperor's Deflauce of Public Opinion.

BERLIN, May 11.-Several newspapers publish the details of a remarkable scene at the barracks of the Emperor Francis Joseph regiment last Saturday night, when Emperor William was entertained at a banquet in the officer's casino. The emperor drank freely, and spoke to his neighbors of the necessity of a soldier's forgetting during his service that he had any duties except to his war lord and country. Finally the emperor called to a private at the entrance: "Call in Leuck. I have something to say to him."

To most of the officers the words were a complete surprise, as Lueck is the sentry who killed one citizen and wounded another in the Wrangle Strass weeks ago. The case had been investigated, and Lueck, at the emperor's instance had, been promoted to be lance corporal. Even among military men the opinion prevailed that the affair should be dropped out of sight as soon as possible, for the shooting and promotion cauted a storm of indignation throughout the empire and several deputies are known to be ready to raise another storm in the reichstag when that body assembles.

In the pause which followed the call for Leuck the emperor explained that he was about to reward the lance corporal for his faithfulness to duty, and wished all the officers present to show exceptional respect for the young man. When Leuck entered the officers and guests followed the emperor in rising, and Leuck was ordered to stand facing his sovereign. The emperor then took his seat, and while the rest stood addressed Leuck thus:

"Leuck, you are a splendid soldier. You maintained, as a sentry of the Third regiment of the guards to Wran-gel Strasse, the best traditions of my army, its discipline and honor. I hope that every soldier will follow your example on similar occasions and will have the same clear understanding of his duties towards me, my army and himself. Leuck, you are an honor to your regiment and your merit shall not go unrewarded."

The emperor ordered that a glass of wine be given to Leuck, and all present under the command of the emperor drank to Leuck's health. The emperor then had fetched his portrait bearing his autograph and presented it to Leuck. The lance corporal blushed and saluted, and was then allowed to refire. This astounding scene was kept secret, as the opinion of all present, even of those sympathizing with the emperor's sentiments, was that this young war lord had done an exceedingly unpolitic act, and that the country was hardly in a condition to discuss it calmly.

The emperor, however, was apparently determined to let his people know his sentiments, for at the Paradeon, the Tempel Hoeferdel, he unexpectedly ap-peared on horseback and rode up before Leuck's regiment and called out the young man. He repeated his com-mendation of Saturday night, expressed the hope that Leuck's comrades would rove as faithful to their soldierly duties as had the lance corporal, and closed by nominating Leuck for exemption.

This speech, together with an account of what took place in the officer's casino on Saturday night was published by the newspapers yesterday. The publication, with but few exceptions, was accompanied with bitter comments upon the emperor's apparent effort to emphasize his defiance of public opinion. Vorwaerts, Frissinige Zeitung. Boersen-Courier and the Kreuz Zeitung are especially severe.

Indiana's Tax Law Unconstitutional Indianapolis, May 10 .- The Indiana bankers won their case against the new state law in the supreme court. Under the law one board of tax commissioners could fine and imprison for a refusal to answer questions asked by the board, and Philip C. Decker, president of an Evansville bank, who refused to testify concerning deposits in the bank, was sent to jail, but released on habeas corpus writ. The supreme court passed on the case and decided that the clause inflicting fines and imprisonment was unconstitutional, but that it did not vitiate the act, the other radical provisions of which are now in litigation.

VULKOVITCH'S ASSASSINS.

The Two Murderers Condemned to Death.

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 11 .- The two men, Merdjan and Christo, who were charged with the murder of Dr. Vulkovitch, the Bulgarian diplomatic agent to Turkey, have been found guilty and condemned to death. Tufeketchiff and the brothers Naoum, who were known to be the instigators of the crime, fled to Russia, but they, too, though without Turkish jurisdiction, were tried and each sentenced to fifteen years, penal

servitde. It is believed that the result of these trials will cause a relaxation of the tension between Bulgaria and Turkey which it was thought at one time would lead the former to throw off all allegiance to Turkey and declare herself in-

Dr. Vulkovitch, the Bulgarian diplomatic agent in Constantinople, stabbed in that city on Feb. 24, and died from his wounds on the 26th. The victim of the assassins was buried at Philippopolis, where the funeral attracted an enormous crowd of excited people, delegations being present from every part of Bulgaria. Prince Ferdinand himself was present, and awaited on the platform the train bringing the remains of Dr. Vulkovitch from Constantinople. The latter is now regarded as one of the Bulgarian martyrs, and his death has contributed its share to-

wards the ultimate independence of the

principality.

Saw Her Baby Devoured. MOUNTAIN HOME, Ark., May 11 .- Mrs. Mary Carter, a widow with a family of small children, is a raving maniac as a result of a raid upon her little cabin by a half starved black bear, in which two of her children lost their lives and one was half devoured before her eyes. Her children were playing near the house when suddenly their wild screaming startled the mother. She saw an enor-mous bear strike down her oldest boy, who had bravely attempted to defend the children in his charge. The beast seized her baby and shuffled rapidly away. The animal tore the little one limb from limb before the mother's eyes, and before help arrived from the village completed his meal and escaped to the

The Faribault Plan Allowed. MINNEAPOLIS, May 11 .- An autograph letter has been received in this city from Archbishop Ireland at Rome, which, it is believed by his friends here settles beyond cavil the attitude of the vatican towards the socalled Faribault plan. The letter says: "The socalled Faribault plan is now formally allowed in spite of Germans and Jesuits. The decision is 'tolerari protest,' means canonically, 'is fully allowed. A letter addressed to me in the name of the propaganda brings out the full practical meaning of the words. The plan is, of course, a departure from the ideal -and in case of a departure the canonical language is 'tolerari protest.' But they imply for practice a full approval."

Liquor at the World's Fair. CHICAGO, May 11 .- The World's fair managers have made up their minds to sell liquor on the fair grounds, even if it takes a special act of the legislature to make liquor selling possible. The pro-gramme now, as outlined by a director, is to go ahead, letting concessions for the sale of malt and vinous liquors, and ask the next legislature to pass a special law, giving over to the directors the absolute control of Jackson park and Midway plaisance, exempting that territory from the operations of municipal police

Fully 10,000 persons are in attendance. The parade of the visiting knights took place yesterday afternoon, many visiting lodges from Philadelphia, Lancaster, Harrisburg and points in the Cumberland valley participating. The convention was called to order by the state master last evening. Today a grand excursion to the Gettysburg battle field will take place.

Applied for a Writ of Habeas Corpus. CARLISLE, Pa., May 11 .- The party arrested a few nights ago as being Joe Keys, the notorious wife murderer, now confined in the Franklin jail, has made application for habeas corpus proceedings to secure his release from prison. The supposed murderer says his name is Lewis Jachin, from Germany. Although several persons from Shippens burg are positive he is the right man, others say he is not. The matter was investigated yesterday by the court, and the man was discharged.
