TOWN OF SPANGLER.

Named After one of Bellefonte's Brilliant Legal Lights. Some time ago we gave a sketch of the town of Hastings, located in Cambria county, and in the heart of one of the richest bituminous coal fields in Pennsylvania.

Col. J. L. Spangler, to whom great credit is due for the discovery and organization of these large coal operations, now comes in for due recognition, since a new town five miles from Hastings, which promises to be an important railroad and mining centre, has been laid out and named "Spangler."

The operations are fully developed, there will be employment furnished to at least 2,000 miners in a very short time. This means other labor in and about the mines of an additional 1,000 men.

For business of all kinds, such as hotels, stores, shops, bakers, butchers, tailors, mechanics, workmen, there is no better outlook anywhere. So far as is known, none of these companies intend to own or control, directly or indirectly, company stores.

The development of the town is in charge of the Spangler Improvement Company which consists of the following prominent gentlemen: Hon. E. A. Bigler, President; Col. J. L. Spangler, Treasurer and Trustee; J. W. Campbell, Secretary.

On Tuesday, June 14, 1892, the sale of lots begins on the ground at Spangler. This is the first opportunity given and will attract many buyers.

EATS THROUGH A FUNNEL.

Charles Shaw, of Chattanooga, Tenn., is attracting much attention from the medical profession. He is under treatment at the hospital for sore throat. Two years ago, by mistake, he took a swallow of carbonic acid. The fluid destroyed the lining of the throat and entirely closing the esophagus.
