PENNSYLVANIA GAME LAWS.

Correct Guide for Hunters and Fishermen for the Year 1892.

The following game laws taken from the *American Field*, are given as correct in every detail, and hunters and fishermen should paste them in their hats:

Elks and deer, October 1 to December 15; and owing to an error it is illegal to have deer in possession after November 30. The killing of fawns when in spotted coat, chasing of elks or deer with hounds, and the killing of deer when in the water prohibited. Squirrels, September 1 to January 3. Hares or rabbits, November 1 to January 1. Hunting or killing of rabbits with ferrets prohibited. Wild turkey, October 15 to January 1. Plovers, July 15 to January 1. Woodcocks, July 4 to January 1. Quails, November 1 to December 15. Ruffed and pinnated grouse, October 1 to January 1. Rails and reed birds, September 1 to December 1. Wildfowl, September 1 to May 1. Insectivorous birds protected, except English sparrows. Pigeon nestings protected against firearms to a radius of one-fourth mile from roosting or breeding place, and disturbance in any manner while nesting, and snaring or netting for the purpose of killing during the nesting season prohibited. Snaring, netting or catching of game birds by torchlight prohibited. Sunday hunting and shooting prohibited. Shooting of wildfowl limited to use of shoulder gun only. Salmon or grilse, March 1 to August 15. Speckled trout, April 15 to July 15; under five inches in length protected. Lake trout, January 1 to October 1. Black, green, yellow, willow-rock, Lake Erie and grass bass, and wall-eyed pike or Susquehanna salmon, June 1 to January 1. Pike and pickerel, June 1 to February 1. Bass less than six inches in length protected. German carp, September 1 to May 1. Artificially stocked streams protected for three years after stocking. Hook and line fishing only allowed; use of nets or traps of any kind, poisons, etc. prohibited. Pike county laws—Deer, October 1 to December 1. Squirrels, September 1 to December 15. Gray rabbits, October 15 to December 15. Wood or summer ducks, October 1 to January 1. Woodcocks, July 4 to December 15. Quails, October 15 to December 1. Ruffed grouse, September 15 to December 15. Salmon and speckled trout, May 1 to February 15.

Next came Judge Walter Gresham, who served as Postmaster General and Secretary of the Treasury during the Garfield-Arthur administration. And close upon Judge Gresham's declaration for Cleveland came the ringing letter of Hon. Wayne MacVeagh, Attorney General under Garfield. These men are not mere politicians but statesmen, who rise above party, when the good of the country requires it. Their influence must necessarily be felt in all sections of the country, and well may the republicans be depressed and discouraged, when men of character desert the party and announce their determination to be democrats in the future, because in that party alone must the country seek relief from the oppressions and spoiliations of the republican party, as it is now constituted. Because the democracy represents the cause of the people they feel it their duty to support and vote the democratic ticket, and on account of the high character of the candidates they consider it a great pleasure to do so. Democrats take courage and put forth your best efforts to win. Our cause is a just one, or it would not meet the approval of such men as these.

New Ballot.

There is a great demand on the secretary of state for copies of the revised form of the official ballot and specimen ballot which are to be used under the new election law. There seems to be an idea in the minds of a great many persons who have not seen the revised form of ballot that stickers can be used on the ballot to paste over any name printed thereon. This is wrong. None of the officially printed names can be erased, crossed out or pasted over. Stickers may be used, but they can be legally placed only in the blank spaces in the fourth column of the ballot left for that purpose, and not over another name. In these blank spaces the voter may insert any name he pleases, either by means of a sticker, by writing or stamping.

The strikers at Homestead are being arrested and prosecuted for treason by Carnegie and his managers. Is this the protection and its benefits as promised by the republican leaders four years ago?

If you wish to see your farm products represented at the World's Fair, select a dozen of the choicest ears of corn, or a quart of clover seed, or a peck of buckwheat, or a like quantity of any summer grains, and put them to cure in the best way, then notify Col. Woodward at Harrisburg. If your samples are approved and accepted you will be at no expense in the matter, as the state has provided funds with which to pay freight and the cost of caring for them. None but the very choicest and best, however, will be accepted. Mediocrity can find no room in this great show. We think we could name a half-dozen farmers in this county, who should be represented in this crop exhibit, and hope they will promptly write to Col. Woodward and notify him what they wish to exhibit. His address is simply Harrisburg.
