

A Meeting That May Decide the Special Session Question.

GORMAN FOR THE CABINET

It Is Said Among the Leaders That the Maryland Senator May Be Given the State Portfolio-The New York Senatorship-To Divide Kansas.

NEW YORK, Nov. 28 .- An important conference of Democratic leaders, it is expected, will be held in this city on Tuesday, at which the question of an extra session of congress after the inauguration of Mr. Cleveland will be discussed.

Among others who are expected to be present at the conference are Speaker Crisp, Senators Carlisle, Gorman and Brice, Hon. Don M. Dickinson, Hon. William C. Whitney and other local Democratic leaders, including representatives of congress from this city.

Some of the leading Democratic bankers and business men of the city may also be asked to express their views on the subject of an extra session of congress.

Some of the leaders who will be present at the conference, it is understood, will oppose an extra session of congress and will urge the appointment of a special committee by the present house of representatives to investigate the present tariff system and prepare a bill for the Fifty-third congress. The condition of the treasury will also be discussed in connection with the extra ses sion question.

Senator Faulkner, of West Virginia, who is one of the Democratic leaders in the senate, said that he was not in favor of an extra session of congress, and did not believe

there was any necessity for one. It seems to be the general opinion of the politicians here that Senator Gorman will be offered a place in Mr. Cleveland's cabinet, and most likely, it is said, the secre-taryship of state. Mr. Gorman, however, when questioned on the subject refused to be interviewed.

Smith M. Weed had a short conference with Senator Gorman before the latter started for home. Mr. Weed has been mentioned as a candidate for the United States senatorship, and he, too, refused to talk politics.

State Senator George Z. Erwin and a number of other Republicans from up the state were in town. From some of them it was learned that the Republican votes in the legislature would be cast for Senator Frank Hiscock in the election for United States senator.

The Division of Kansas.

TOPERA, Nov. 28 .- The scheme to divide Kansas and make a new common wealth is gaining adherents every day. A dozen prominent Western Kansas politicians are here, and all admit that the plans have been made to make a fight before congress and the state legislature this winter. A serious obstacle, however, confronts them in the fact that in the proposed new state there are only 223,000 people, which would allow them only one congressman, and not more than two in any event. If the rumors that several prominent Texans and two millionaires of Colorado are in the deal prove to be true the popula tion will be increased many thousands. No Man's Land, to which Texas claims a title, and which borders western Kansas on the south, is to be added to the new state, a strip of country 30 miles wide by 175 long. It is stated that Clark, late candidate for governor of Texas, and others at Fort Worth are in the movement to add No Man's land to the new state.

The Last Session of the Fifty-second Congress Opens Monday.

THE APPROPRIATION BILLS.

It Is the Intention to Push Them as Rapidly as Possible-Holman in Favor of Reductions and Opposed to Any Additional Ships for the Navy.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30 .--- Congress opens on Monday next, and senators and repre- help. sentatives are crowding into the city from all over the country, and an air of importance is beginning to pervade the capital. Preparations for the meeting of congress have been completed at the Capitol. The legislative chambers have been renovated.

It is probable the District of Columbia bill will be ready to report shortly after the opening of the session. It is the purpose to push the appropriation bills as rapidly as possible, and an effort will be made to send at least one of the regular money bills to the senate before the adjournment for the holidays.

Holman on Expenditures.

Mr. Holman, the "watchdog of the treasury," has arrived to begin the work of the session. Speaking of the expenditures for the coming two years, Mr. Holman said:

"There should be reductions all along the line, so that the revenues will not be less than the expenditures. Some of these appropriations have to be met in full and will not permit of any cutting, such, for in-stance, as the pension bill, the solders' home and life saving appropriations, and matters of that class. But there are dher bills wherein very material reductions can be made. The sundry civil ought to be greatly reduced. There are few departments of the government where the expenditures are not greater than the public service requires. The incidental expenses have grown to an enormous extent. I believe that the Republicans in the senate will act with us in reducing all these matters to the minimum.

"This question of public expenditures entered freely into the recent campaign. It has created a sentiment that I have never heard expressed as I have during the past few months. The tendency of the federal government toward extravagance has had its effect upon local governments, both state and municipal, and as the federal expenses have kept going up the expenses of local governments have kept pace with them. People have finally become alarmed over the condition this is bringing us to, and they are looking at it from an entirely different standpoint. A halt must be called on this extravagance, and the Democratic party must do it. For years to come these two questions of taxation and public expenditures will go hand in hand, and be the greatest of all issues before the Amer-




