CARLYLE HARRIS ELECTROCUTED. The Wife Murderer Pays the Death Penalty in the Chair.

SING SING, N. Y., May S .- In the presence of Warden Durston, the prison chaplain, Principal Keeper Cannaughton six physicians and the witnesses provided by law to be present on such occasions, Carlyle W. Harris, who murdered his wife, Hellen Potts-Harris, over two years ago, paid the death penalty in the electrocution chair here to-day. By the killing of Harris the last chapter in one of the most sensational murder cases recorded in the annals of criminal history has been brought to a close and the laws of New York state for crimes of this nature have been fully satisfied.

As there is a conflict of opinion among the American people as regards the guilt or innocence of the executed man, they are now left to weigh both sides of the matter and decide for themselves whether the killing of the condemed was an act of justice or injustice.

The voltage used in electrocuting Harris was 1,700, the same as in the last electrocution. After the current had been turned on fifteen seconds the voltage was gradually reduced to 300 when it was finally turned off and Harris was dead. There was no burning of the skin where the electrodes were placed against the body and there was a general absence of the disagreeable features complained of by physicians and witnesses in the earlier days of the electrocution law. This, of course, is due to the fact that a number of improvements have been made in the machinery of death during the last year.

All of the physicians and others who witnessed the electrocution declare that Harris died a painless death.

After the autopsy this afternoon the body of young Harris will be turned over to his grief-stricken parents who will give it a respectable burial.

Harris said farewell to his father, mother and brother yesterday afternoon and immediately began writing a statement which will be given to the press in a day or so. Last night the indemned man repeated his denial of having committed the crime for which he has suffered death, and said that his execution would be nothing more or less than a judicial murder. Harris did not finish his writing until after midnight.

THREE KILLED BY LIGHTNING.

CARLISLE APPOINTS INVESTIGATORS

The New York Custom House to be Examined Into.

WASHINGTON, May 10 .- Secretary Car lisle has appointed Charles S. Fairchild, ex-secretary of the treasury; Daniel Magone, of Ogdensburg, ex-collector of the port of New York, and General Poindexter Dunn, formerly a member of congress from Arkansas, but now a citizen of California, as a commission to investigate the numerous charges relative to the administration of customs in New York city.

A TRAIN BLOWN FROM THE TRACK. Another Texas Cyclone Exhibits Its Lift-

ing Power.

GAINESVILLE, Tex., May 9 .- A freight train on the Gulf, Colorado and Santa Fe road, while running into Gainesville, was blown from the track by a tornado and demolished. Besides the train crew the roadmaster and Trainmaster Byrne were aboard.

One of the train crew was instantly killed and the rest seriously injured. The city was slightly brushed by the tornado, but only half a dozen houses were blown down, with no damage to life.

Still Another Cyclone in Arkansas,

FULTON, Ark., May 9 .- A disastrous cyclone swept over a section of the country northeast of here. The forest trees in a swath three miles wide have been twisted off and uprooted. Houses and barns are scattered in all directions.

It is impossible to learn anything regarding the casualties, but it is likely that con-siderable destruction of life has resulted at Saratoga, fourteen miles from here.






